DISTRICT PUBLIC SAFETY

The program was to support the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund to honor Michigan's law enforcement professionals with a special event that will support the National Law Enforcement Museum.



• Members from the District Public Safety Department went to the Detroit Police Pistol Range for a follow-up exercise to basic firearm qualifications. The basic training was designed to educate the officers regarding the multi-faceted role of the armed officer. They were taught the significance of weapon safety, legal implications for armed personnel, the importance of understanding departmental firearms policies and practical experience in a live fire environment.

FEDERAL WORK STUDY PROGRAM

The Eastern Campus hosted more than 120 federal work study students, staff, and off-campus partners for the 3rd Annual Federal Work Study Luncheon. This event was held to show appreciation to our students and the supervisors who serve as mentors to them.



ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

- The Administration and Finance Division is currently in Phase Two, Budget Planning and Preparation of WCCCD's Multi-Campus Budget Development Process. This phase is one of the most vital steps in the entire process. The preparation of the draft budget includes projecting revenue for the District in the form of property taxes, tuition and fees. Similarly, projections of future expenses, such as salaries and fringes and other operating expenses are also prepared. These operating expenses are based on the financial requirements needed to achieve divisional and departmental goals for the upcoming fiscal year.
- The Division is also working with the Information Technology Division in order to implement online ACH (Automated Clearing House) payments. Students will have the ability to pay their tuition and fees online through their checking or savings accounts. This will give students more options in paying their tuition. Additionally this will benefit students who don't have access to credit or debit cards to pay online.



WORLD BOOK NIGHT

The first-ever World Book Night occurred this week in the United States. As a result, volunteers distributed a total of 500,000 paperback books in several communities. One of the books included <u>The Hunger Games</u> written by Suzanne Collin's. English Faculty Member, Jim Schaeffer distributed this book to his students and hoped that this project will be repeated again next year as a vibrant way to increase literacy.



STUDENT SERVICES



- Students and advisors of Phi Theta Kappa attended the annual International Convention. The convention was extremely beneficial for networking and learning what's happening nationally and internationally in the PTK organization. Congratulations to Earlene Williams for receiving the coveted Advisor Award. This award recognizes advisors with at least four years or more of service.
- As part of the District's continued mission to empower our students through excellent and accessible services, the Student Services Division partnered with the Downtown Campus to host students from Chandler Park Academy for on-site COMPASS assessment and a campus tour. The visit was part of the student's orientation into the Dual Enrollment Program and will prepare them for Summer 2012registration.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Solomon Asmelash attended a one-day conference to investigate best practices and research a solution for the growing challenges of managing, retaining and storing email. Over the last several years the use and size of the email system has been growing with the growth the District has experienced. Therefore, it is very important that the District implement email retention and archiving.


