- Congress passed, and the President has signed into law, the VOW to Hire Heroes Act of 2011. Included in this new law is the Veterans Retraining Assistance Program (VRAP). VRAP offers up to 12 months of training assistance to unemployed Veterans. The program has very widely been advertised and has increased the numbers of veterans using benefits at WCCCD significantly.
- Yolanda Brock-Wisniewski and Hasina Philyaw attended the Association of Veterans Education Certifying Officials Conference in St. Louis. Ms. Philyaw has been hired as a member of the WCCCD Veterans Office team to better assist the growing numbers of military veterans attending WCCCD.

THE MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION

The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education hosted several organizations this week.

Healthlink held a Medical Transportation for a Train the Trainer: An Instructors Course in Coaching the Emergency Vehicle Operator (CEVO): Ambulance workshop. The goal of the CEVO course is to facilitate the student's knowledge of the laws involving the operation of an emergency vehicle, with practical hands on opportunities to evaluate each student's driving abilities.



- The Wayne County Sheriff's Department held a Terrorism Trends and Tactics Workshop provided by the U.S. Secret Service. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The Michigan Legislature has been unusually active in recent weeks in terms of actions that will have a significant impact on WCCCD and the other Michigan community colleges. Legislative initiatives currently in progress include:



Community college state aid appropriations: The Michigan Community College Association is continuing its efforts to create a meaningful set of performance indicators and to avoid onerous reporting requirements.

Community college baccalaureate authorization: The authorization of community colleges to offer selected baccalaureate degrees is under consideration in the State Senate with considerable opposition from universities and other baccalaureate institutions. (WCCCD is not currently considering the offering of baccalaureate programs even if this legislation passes; the district will instead continue to increase access of our citizens to baccalaureate degrees through the efforts of the University Center in partnership with four-year colleges and universities.)

MPSERS— Talks continue in Lansing about the best way to address retirement reform for public school employees in Michigan.

Capital Outlay— At long last, nine of the community college projects that received planning authorization back in 2010 can move ahead with construction.

Dual Enrollment– Senate Bill 622, 623, 709 and 710 was signed into law and will expand opportunities for high school students to gain exposure to college-level course work.

Healthcare Cap: Senate Bill 7 was signed into law and will have a broad impact on community colleges as it attempts to control costs for employee health insurance.

Liquor Licenses— For many years a community college that wanted a liquor license had to go through every legislative session hoping that their institution would be among the one or two added to the magic list of those granted a license. Under Senate Bill 502, now signed into law, that process is much less arbitrary and allows colleges to respond to changing circumstances without jumping through legislative hurdles.

Personal Property Tax— Protecting community college revenues from erosion due to change or repeal of the personal property tax is a top priority for the MCCA. So far, Senate Bills 1065-1072 reflect the concerns that senators heard from community colleges and other local governments. However, it will be critical that House members continue to hear that message from their colleges throughout the summer and fall as they look to act on the bills.

Financial Aid Guide- U. S. Department of Education and Consumer Financial Protection Bureau unveiled their new "shopping sheet" aimed at standardizing information that institutions send to prospective students regarding financial aid. The shopping sheet would include, for each student, total costs of enrollment broken down into tuition, housing, books and transportation; grants and scholarships broken down by type.
