



DISTRICT PUBLIC SAFETY



Lieutenants Bahrija Livadic, Alexis Townsend, Vanessa Liddell and Aziz Faison attended a Terrorism Trends and Tactics Workshop conducted by the U.S. Secret Services. The workshop covered various topics such as concealed explosives, chemical/biological threats, and Vehicle Borne Improvised Explosive Devices (VBIEDs).

LEADERSHIP TRAINING

The command staff has been engaged in leadership training conducted by Dawud Muhammad. This training is designed to prepare law enforcement administrators for senior positions by combining principles with practical applications. The most recent session included a discussion on the book <u>Effective Police Leadership</u> by Thomas E. Baker and a lecture on professional ethics.







A quick revolution has started in higher ed. The back end of this revolution is the "Big Data – Fast Data" technology and involves premier universities like Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Harvard. The real power of these systems lies in how fast they can compute and retrieve data. The goal is to improve student learning. One of the examples is to automatically notify staff advisers when individual students need help through an analytically driven alert system. Michigan College/University Partnership Update

Dr. Ella Davis, Discipline Chair of the English Department, provided certification training to the new Learning Community instructors for the Fall. Learning Community teachers work together in their linked classes by sharing a common syllabus. Teaching techniques were discussed and instructors took away from the training a heightened understanding of how students benefit from this coordination of teaching.

TRANSCRIPT EVALUATION PROCESS

The Admissions and Records Office met with representatives from Hyland Software to explore methods of improving and speeding up the incoming transfer credit evaluation process. The office is seeking ways to post transfer credit more quickly in response to the high demand for immediate evaluations for graduating students, financial aid recipients, military education benefit users and students applying for admittance to select programs.

REVISED SUBMISSION FROM LAST WEEK OFFICE OF VETERAN AFFAIRS

Congress passed, and the President has signed into law, the VOW to Hire Heroes Act of 2011. Included in this new law is the Veterans Retraining Assistance Program (VRAP). VRAP offers up to 12 months of training assistance to unemployed Veterans. The program has been very widely advertised and has significantly increased the numbers of veterans using benefits at WCCCD. Key members of the Veterans Office attended the Association of Veterans Education Certifying Officials Conference in St. Louis to interact with colleagues across the country and explore best practices in order to better assist the growing numbers of military veterans attending WCCCD.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

Fall Instructional Supplies

The Fiscal Accountability Operations Center (FAOC) is working diligently to ensure that instructional supplies are on hand for the Fall semester. Instructional supplies are very important in the teaching and learning process. More than 150 instructional supply requests for Fall 2012 have been identified to be processed and completed. Approximately 134 of these requests havebeen reviewed and completed by budget for processing.

INSTITUTIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

Did you know?

- 81% of WCCCD New Entering Students who participated in the Entering Student Experience Survey indicated that their goal for attending college was to improve their academic skills before going to a large university? The Entering Student Experience Survey gathers information such as a student's previous academic background, academic goals and expectations they have upon entering WCCCD.
- A national research report by Noel Levitz, "2012 National Freshman Attitudes Report", findings indicate a high value in higher education? Nearly, 94% of community college freshmen express a strong desire to continue their education and a determination to finish their degree.

THE MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION

The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education (MIPSE) hosted Healthlink Medical Transportation for a Train the Trainer: An Instructors Course in Coaching the Emergency Vehicle Operator (CEVO): Ambulance workshop. The goal of the CEVO course was to facilitate the student's knowledge of the laws involving the operation of an emergency vehicle with practical hands-on opportunities to evaluate each student's driving abilities.







♦ MIPSE, in conjunction with District Public Safety Department held a bomb threat training workshop at the Northwest Campus. The bomb threat procedure within the District Emergency Response Plan was reviewed with emphasis placed on receiving a threat via the telephone as well as how to determine if the threat is creditable.
