DISTRICT PUBLIC SAFETY

The District Public Safety Department is continuously finding ways to keep our students, staff, and faculty members safe. Here are some helpful tips on what to look for to have a safer commute while using public transportation:

- Try to avoid isolated bus or train stops and times when few people are around.
- Stay away from the curb until bus/train arrives.
- If possible, sit near the driver and notify him or her of any problems.
- ♦ A crowded bus is a prime target for pick pockets; carry your bags close and carry your wallet in your coat of front pant pocket.
- ♦ If someone is bothering or harassing you, move to another seat location and/or tell the person in a loud voice to "STAY AWAY."
- Remain on the bus/train if you are uncomfortable with getting off.

THE MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION

The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education (MIPSE) hosted several organizations this week:

• Students enrolled in the Fire Protection Technology Program attended an orientation. Discussions included an overview of the program and safety objectives, code of dress and behavior; as well as academic expectations.



- A meeting of the Wayne County's Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) Team's was held. The CISM responds to requests around the county for interventions with people who have experienced a recent traumatic event. The team is composed of volunteers in mental health, social work, health, first responders, and clergy.
- ◆ The Wayne County Sheriff's Department held a workshop on how to open a new jail. They discussed managing the change, staffing, furniture, inmate orientation, and training.
- ♦ MIPSE, in conjunction with the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, hosted members of the Wayne County Prosecutor's office in a gun safety class.
- ♦ Local media attended a Fire OPS 101 workshop. The training allowed the media to experience scenarios that fire departments face each day.
