The discussion, which centered on the theme: "The Learning Collaborative: Dual Enrollment and Beyond," reinforced Dr. Covington's vision to "change the paradigm of public education" by providing opportunity for every EAA high school student to earn

college credit while completing their high school diploma. Six EAA high school principals attended and are eager to have their students enrolled in courses hosted at the high school and on WCCCD's campuses.

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
Program Reviews

Traveling Abroad Safety Tips

In an effort to be proactive in crime prevention information for students, staff and faculty, the District Public Safety Department is providing the following safety tips while studying or traveling abroad:



- Gain as much information as possible about the country that you will travel to.
- Visit the following websites:
 - http://www.travel.state.gov (overview)
 - http://travel.state.gov/travel/requirements/ (passport or entry requirements)
 - http://travel.state.gov/travel/cis_pa_tw/cis_1765.html (Consular Information Sheets)
 - www.cdc.gove/travel (inoculation requirements)
- ♦ Check your medical health insurance coverage.
- ♦ Make two extra copies of all your travel information (passport, airline tickets, etc.); leave one set at home with a relative or close friend and take a copy with you.
- Know your credit card limits.
- Make certain that a trusted family member is aware of the location of all your legal papers; legal will, insurance documents, mortgage information, internet/cell phone passwords, etc.
- ♦ Leave valuable or expensive looking jewelry at home.
- Do not bring large amounts of cash; use traveler's checks or credit cards.
- ◆ Take a list of all important telephone numbers (family, U.S. Embassy and Consulate, campus emergency numbers).
- ♦ When you arrive, secure a copy of your important information in a safe and secure location.
- Bring an extra pair of prescription glasses.
- Pack your medical prescriptions in their original containers.
- ♦ Mark all luggage on the inside and outside with your name, address and telephone number; if possible cover your outside luggage tags.

THE MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION

The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education hosted Wayne County Sheriff's Training Unit for a patrol rifle class. This class taught the attendees the basic functions of loading, unloading and maintenance of the rifle. They had to demonstrate their ability to fire the weapon in a prone, kneeling and moving position.



ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

- The Fiscal Accountability Operations Center (FAOC) would like to thank everyone who assisted in the year-end close process. For the 2011/2012 Fiscal, FAOC processed 3,401 requisitions. This represents a 10.8% increase from the previous fiscal year. As a result of departments entering completed and detailed information into the Banner system, the number of incomplete requisitions was decreased. The goal for the new fiscal year is to further enhance the automated requisition process.
- Throughout the year, the District has stepped into high gear to provide the needed deferred maintenance repairs and renovations. Several major projects were accomplished and we continue to address maintenance issues on an ongoing basis. We are working closely with all campus facilities personnel to address issues and concerns. This will enable us to incorporate Campus priorities with the District's work schedule assignments. Some renovations are currently performed by District staff. We will continue to utilize our work crew to address upgrades, repairs and renovations throughout the District.

LEGISLATIVE CORNER

State and Legislative Updates:

MPSERS— As previously reported, SB 1040 was passed by the legislature and is waiting to be signed by Governor Snyder. The bill would not require all new employees to move into a defined contribution (401k) style) plan, but would require the state to conduct a study on the costs of converting to a defined contribution plan, with study results deliverable by November 15, 2012.



♦ The New Report on Michigan's Low-Skilled Adults found that many workers lack not only occupational skills, which keeps them stuck in low-wage work, but they lack the basic skills necessary to acquire occupational skills. National Matters:

- Federal Budget— Congress recently adjourned until September 10, with just a few legislative days remaining until it adjourns again for the elections. Congress is not expected to reach any conclusions on the major fiscal issues— expiring Bush tax cuts, the debt ceiling, and sequestration— until a lame duck session following the November elections at the earliest. Just before recessing, congressional leaders agreed in principle to a 6-month continuing resolution that will keep government agencies funded for the first 6 months of federal FY 2013, which begins October 1.
- Deferred Action Rules Could Lead to Increased Enrollment of Undocumented Students— A new federal policy expanding the rights of certain undocumented youths could lead to increased enrollment at community colleges.
- ♦ At New Online University, Advertisers Will Underwrite Free Degrees— The World Education University, a free online entity which opens this fall, is focused on an interesting revenue model. They are looking at revenue for advertisers, corporate sponsorships and fee-based tutoring or charging for premium content.
- News from Missouri A Missouri university that offers associate degrees is telling its students that if they make a good faith effort to attain good grades, they can retake courses in which they do poorly— at no cost to them.

Wayne County Community College District Receives Candidacy for Accreditation by National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission

Wayne County Community College District recently received notification from the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission, Inc. (NLNAC) that it has granted candidacy for accreditation for the College's Associate of Science in Nursing Program. "This is the first step in the accreditation of our nursing program. We are very pleased with achieving the status and thank Dr. Doresea Lewis for her leadership as dean of nursing as well as our faculty and staff for assisting the District in this process," states Dr. Debraha Watson, President of Northwest Campus - Provost of Health Science.
