

The Educational Affairs Division annually conducts assessment and curriculum reviews of programs and courses offered at the District. Congratulations and thank you to Electrical Electronics Engineering, Mechatronics, Numerical Control: Electrical Engineering Curriculum Focus and Math, 2011 Curriculum Focus disciplines that have completed and submitted comprehensive reviews and recommendations for their career areas.



- ♦ In addition to the review and assessment of the curriculum, faculty provided recommendations for course/program modifications, textbook and learning management software assessment results, proposed modifications for labor and industry.
- CharMaine Hines, Associate Vice Chancellor of Adjunct Faculty and Curriculum, in conjunction with faculty, developed a professional development and instructional resources website titled "The Scholar's Corner: for Adjunct Faculty." The objective of the site is to promote the advancement of instructional innovation, strengthen processes to support effective student learning and enhance the development of institutional resources to enhance student success. The website will officially launch on January 14.

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WEBSITES HITS

For the week of January 4 - 10, we received 57,852 visits to our website. Visits came from 51 countries and were viewed in 31 languages. We received 5,073 hits for the academic schedules and 3,697 hits for the college catalog. The average time on the site is 6:13 minutes.

Eastern


- Roof repaired in Cooper room which was repaired in August leaks again

- Foundation leak at AAB, LSB, and WC. (LSB and WC are complete, AAB is not)
- Main gate at the east entrance is severely damage (Gate being fabricated)(waiting on response from contractor that damaged gate)
- A new pedestrian entrance is needed at lot G off the Southfield Service Drive (on hold until spring)
- ♦ Equipment needed for snow removal this season (expected delivery 1/20/12)
- Replacement door needed for exterior west stairwell AAB (waiting for quote)
- Carpeting in L17 in the Laboratory Science Building is in need of replacement
- Carpet repairs need in the Learning Resource Center
- New computer lab in the Health Science Center (EXPANDED AS DISCUSSED IN THE NLNAC MEETING)
