STUDENT SERVICES

In the Student Service News...

Democrats in the Michigan Senate are creating legislation that would give each of the state's high school graduates college grants to help pay for tuition costs at Michigan's public universities and community colleges. The state's plan would give nearly \$9,500 per year to each student. While the funding for these grants has yet to be clearly laid out, early reports indicate that state Democrats have several ideas in the works including closing tax loopholes, ending tax credits, and collecting sales tax from out-of-state retailers.

DISTRICT PUBLIC SAFETY

BEST PRACTICES

Sergeant Calvin Boylston and Officer Bruce McCalpin from Oakland Community College's Public Safety Department conducted a best practice session with Lieutenant Bahrija Livadic and Sergeant Alexis Townsend. The training addressed how to properly assist students and staff with lock out services, focusing on safety techniques. The District is reviewing whether to implement these emergency lock out services for our students, faculty and staff.



ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

- In a continuous effort to increase transparency, accountability and ensure the integrity of the District's Title IV funding, the Administration and Finance Division and the Financial Aid Division have been working diligently to prepare the initial disbursement for Spring 2012. This collaboration will ensure that funds are received, managed, and disbursed to students in accordance with federal regulations.
- ♦ The Division is preparing and reconciling vendor payments in anticipation for issuing Miscellaneous 1099 tax forms for the 2011 calendar year. The process includes reviewing payments, corresponding with vendors to request "tax identification numbers" and current address.

THE SCHOOL OF CONTINUING EDUCATION AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

- ◆ Dr. James Robinson is attending a six-day workshop titled "Business Solutions Professional Certification Training for Southeast Michigan Regional." The goal of this training is to integrate with Michigan Works agencies, economic development agencies, two-four year colleges, business development groups, unions, local/state government, Michigan State University Extension, community partners and the Workforce Development Agency-State of Michigan (WDA). Dr. Robinson will take part in a roundtable to discuss challenges facing Michigan businesses among other topics.
- ♦ This week the School of Continuing Education is pleased to announce the awarding of the first cohort of participants in the State Board Continuing Education Units (SB-CEU's) program. Participants received certificates granted by the State of Michigan in the areas of: Creating a Classroom Website and Grammar Refresher. These courses are delivered online through our educational partners e2go, which allows educators the opportunity to earn SB-CEU's to maintain certification.

ON THE MOVE...

- Dennis Andrew of MIPSE met with JaNay Newton and Jamie Worrell from Solutia to discuss refresher classes in Incident Command System. The training is expected to begin in the Spring.
- Dr. Sandra Robinson represented the Corporate College at the Eastern Campus at Governor Rick Snyder's State of the State address in Lansing.

CAMPUS PRESIDENT'S CORNER

- The Downriver Campus hosted an onsite orientation/training program for students taking online classes for the first time. Completion of either the on-line or face-to-face orientation/training program is mandatory for all distance learning students.
- ♦ The Downriver Campus also hosted a team meeting of the Building Training, Building Quality Partnership program. Through the Affordable Care Act, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has been asked by Congress to oversee a demonstration grant program to train individuals to become qualified Personal Care Aides (PCAs) − those aides working outside of certified nursing homes, home health agencies, and hospice.
- ♦ The Entrepreneurial Institute and Resource Center held a workshop with Terrell Thomas, a local entrepreneur and Senior Partner of The Thomas Law Firm, P.L.L.C. Mr. Thomas discussed wills and trusts, the relevance of estate planning, and power of attorney. Mark Potter, the second speaker for this workshop discussed "How to Purchase and Sell Tax Deeds". He also discussed the pros and cons of purchasing and selling tax deeds.
- ♦ The Detroit Department of Elections, in partnership with the School of Continuing Education, has resumed their Poll Worker Training classes at the Downtown Campus. The sessions are designed to educate community residents, who are interested in working the polls for upcoming elections, about assisting with the voting process.
- The Downtown Campus is getting a "face lift" with several renovations planned and in progress. Thus far, new carpet has been installed throughout a few hallways and contractors are currently working on the interior lights and the replacement of the chillers.

LEGISLATIVE CORNER

- ◆ The Michigan Legislature enacted two education bills at the end of the 2011 calendar year. House Bill 4163 prohibits bulling or harassment in schools. This bill was made Public Act 241 effective December 6, 2011.
- ♦ Senate Bill 618 on Charter School Expansion amends Public Act 451 and revises the school code by removing restrictions limiting the formation of charter schools.



MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION



The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education (MIPSE) hosted a ceremony for emergency medical technician students. Participants received Certificates of Completion and a MIPSE pin. Instructors from the program were present to congratulate the students.

BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA

The Downriver Campus hosted the Boy Scouts of America, Mahican District Merit Badge Mania. This event provided Boy Scouts an opportunity to earn up to four merit badges. Over 40 different merit badge counselors assisted the scouts. Adult leadership classes such as Merit Badge Counselor training and Troop Committee Challenge were also provided.

- Security cameras (Bids going to board in January)
- ♦ Copiers (Delivery date: January 27)
- Evacu-chair (requisition in approval process)

- Replacement door needed for exterior west stairwell AAB (waiting on quote)
- Carpeting in L17 in the Laboratory Science Building is in need of replacement (Vendor to look at this week to give a guote)
