TOP 5 TIPS FOR PERSONAL AND PROPERTY SAFETY ON CAMPUS

It's time to start back-to-college planning, and buying school supplies. Students will be meeting new friends and enjoying all that the college experience has to offer. However, as a first timer at a college there are many things a student can be unfamiliar with that pertains to personal safety risks, often sharing too much information and exposing themselves to a variety of security threats, including theft. Here's a list of 5 tips that college students should keep in mind during their time on the college campuses grounds:

- Be safe online. In today's digital age it's too easy to share personal information online. Avoid updates on any websites that share your location or personal information and make sure your settings are private.
- ♦ Lock and check your car. Be sure to always lock your car and never leave any valuables in plain view. Remember to also check on it from time to time.
- Map it out. Take time to familiarize yourself with the campus. You should know where your phones are located, the best-lit paths to take and the safest ways to get around during both the day and night. Be aware and observant of your surroundings. Check out the services your campus offers such as evening and late night walking escorts and other safe transportation systems.
- Protect your stuff. Whether studying in the library, it's tempting to run to the bathroom or grab a quick snack while leaving your laptop, identification, smart phone or keys on the table.
- ♦ Know your numbers. This includes campus security and the telephone numbers to your bank and credit card company. Should you have your wallet stolen or be put in a risky situation, you will have all the contact information you need. Also, sign up for your school alert system to be notified of emergency situations on campus via text, email or phone.

MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION (MIPSE)

Education (MIPSE) hosted operators of the Detroit Edison Fermi II Plant in Monroe County as they attended a half-day Fire Brigade training. They refreshed their training in the use of fire extinguishers, foam application and fire extinguishing including the burn room. This annual training is a requirement of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.



- MIPSE hosted members of Detroit Edison Energy Generation Plants. Attendees participated in a three-day training session to become members of the fire brigade. The training taught them the basics of fire behavior, when the fire has grown beyond their abilities, how to use fire extinguishers and self contained breathing apparatus. These employees will be the plant's first line of defense until the local fire departments can respond.
- MIPSE hosted members of the U.S. Customs and Border Protection K-9 Unit for training. The dogs are trained to find either narcotics or food. Such items were strategically placed throughout the training grounds and the dogs had to find them. When they find the substance, the dog is trained to sit down. These dogs go through weeks of training before they are placed in the field.
- MIPSE hosted Wayne County Sheriff's Training Unit for a Patrol Rifle Class. This class taught the attendees the basic functions of load, unloading and maintenance of the rifle. They had to demonstrate their ability to fire the weapon in a prone, kneeling and moving position.

The Student Association of Veterinary Technicians for WCCCD held a fund raiser over the past semester and raised \$1,500.00 which was donated to Horse's Haven. This is a place where horses whose owners are no longer able to afford to care for the animal or the animal has been taken away due to neglect or abuse are relocated.

This is a full-circle resource company for building owners and property managers. Interested students from across the District attended the presentation. Students where provided follow-up information on various fields within the company and were given tips on professionally preparing resumes as well as job interview techniques.



- Frank Romba met with Chris Roberts' from Applied Technology Systems to discuss the latest trends in training technology that is available in the Renewable Energy area.
- College for Kids Summer Camps continues at the Western Campus. The campers, in partnership with Romulus Middle School, explored Spanish Language and Culture. With hands-on workshops, they created significant projects of "Ojo De Dios" relating to the history of the Spaniards as they arrived to the New world.
- The Northwest Campus has undergone some strategic re-organization of utilized space. The CNA Lab has been extended to include restroom facilities which will better prepare our students for certification. In addition, the EMT suite has been relocated to an open floor concept allowing students to easily transition between classroom and lab environments. These changes allow us to enhance instruction while maximizing space.


