Developmental

Mathematics Redesign

The Division of Educational Affairs reviewed the District's mathematics offerings in an effort to support the redesigning of the developmental mathematics courses. A comprehensive analysis shows that about 75% of the programs require specific mathematics courses, while the remaining 25% requires a variety of math courses based on student choice.

The Mathematics faculty met for a training session on how to teach the newly developed MAT 115 (Pre-College Mathematics) course. The training was conducted by Pearson Publishing, our partner in the development process.

Schedule Development

The Educational Affairs Division has established an academic schedule timeline for development of the Spring 2013 Schedule. Meetings were held with each campus to identify which classes will be offered, spring schedule rollover, discipline statistics, trends, course sequencing, time matrix requirements, and fill rates.

Critical Thinking in Education

A recent article on assessment and engagement in education, authors noted "educators should encourage curricular change that will positively impact the learning process in a way that will have fundamental application for a broad spectrum of learners. Assessing critical thinking includes an understanding of general reasoning and skill sets specific to the discipline. Key aspects of the District assessment model of learning includes:

- Understanding how critical thinking is defined by discipline
- Aligning assessment with instructional focus
- Conducting assessments that are sensitive to changes over time
- Embedding assessment and feedback into instruction




away due to neglect or abuse are relocated.

DALNET (Detroit Area Library Network) Updates Report

With the new reporting structure implemented by DALNET, each member institution can refine the reports generated by Horizon, our library management system. The following is a report that depicts the volume of library items checked out in June 2012 District-wide by the type of borrower.

A total of 1,007 library items checked out for the month of June. The number excludes the AV equipment checked out.



As the Learning Resource Centers continue to move forward with automated reporting, this will result in more reliable data being used for data driven processes within the division.

New Jobs in the Healthcare Fields

A recent study by Georgetown University's Center on Education and the Workforce predicts an increase of 5.6 million new jobs in the healthcare, healthcare paraprofessionals and related sectors to be created by 2020. More than 40% of these positions require a postsecondary certificate or an associate degree. The District offers a variety of heath science programs to meet this demand to include short-term certificates, college certificates and associate degrees to meet the emerging demand for healthcare professionals.

Achieving the Dream

The June 2012 Achieving the Dream (AtD) Data Notes revealed its findings among student's that are single parents and their academic outcomes. Below are a few of the findings:

Close to one-third (32%) of all community college students and half (51%) of AtD Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)-filers have dependents. Students with children face unique challenges—such as childcare, employment, student loans, and housing issues—that make persisting and completing their postsecondary goals more difficult. Data shows that female students were more likely to be single parents than male students, and that female single parents persisted at slightly higher rates than male single parents.

Given that single parents represent a substantial proportion of students on AtD college campuses, it is important that colleges consider this student subgroup as they develop their academic success initiatives, programs, and policies.
