

Learning Resource Center

As we draw to the close of the 2011-2012 year, I would like to share some significant accomplishments within the Learning Resource Centers (LRC) District-wide:

- ♦ District-wide book clubs were formed to promote reading literacy among our students, faculty, staff, and community members. During this time, our participants benefited from the two author-facilitated book discussions. We hosted more than 60 participants in just those two sessions.
- The LRC's presented informational sessions and instructional sessions monthly with over 300 participants.
- ♦ During September, each campus LRC participated in National Library Card Sign Up Month and 785 new library users were registered.
- ♦ The Institutional Effectiveness Division reported that the LRC was noted as second in a survey that measured satisfaction with WCCCD services administered to new graduates.



INSTITUTIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

Did you know?

According to the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), the percent increase of students age 25 and over has been larger than the percent increase in the number of younger students, and this pattern is expected to continue. From 2010 to 2019, NCES projects a nine percent rise in enrollment of students under 25, and a 23 percent rise in enrollment of students 25 and over. Although, WCCCD has experienced an increase in the number of traditional students under 25, the percent of non-traditional students, 25 and over continues to be over 50%. Professors and college administrators offer eight tips on how to protect your online identity.

- Google yourself. Know what others see when they search your name.
- ♦ Check the privacy settings on social networks; make sure you know what you are sharing and with whom and if you are not sure about something, don't post it.
- ♦ Remember, you are never anonymous. Almost any content you create and post online can be traced back to you.
- Only keep profiles you actively maintain. Unattended profiles may raise questions so it is best to erase the inactive ones.
- Brush up on copyright and plagiarism laws.
- ♦ Keep your passwords to yourself. Don't open the doors for others to post content under your name.

Presenters introduced our team to innovative ideas and new methods of engagement that can benefit the District's AtD initiatives.









The AtD grant sponsored a professional development program at the Downtown Campus on the use of technology in the classroom. Steve Hargadon, host of the Future of Education interview series was the presenter. Mr. Hargadon enlightened his audience about educational technology and social networking. WCCCD will pilot one such educational technology called Lecture Capture this fall in our AtD Learning Communities.

The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education hosted several organizations this week:
