DISTRICT PUBLIC SAFETY

INSTITUTIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

The Website Feedback Survey collects data from our website users to assist in evaluating and making improvements to the WCCCD website. The survey was administered online to provide an opportunity for internal and external college community to provide feedback about the website.

Top Three Key Findings

- ♦ 93.0% of respondents indicated they found the information they were looking for;
- ♦ 73.7% of respondents gave a "good-excellent" rating on the information found on the website;
- ♦ 72.6% of respondents indicated they would recommend the website to others.

Achieving the Dream

This program is one of several ideas shared by Dr. Hardiman that can be used in the classroom to effectively engage students and help them succeed.
