EDUCATIONAL AFFAIRS

The Educational Affairs Division is currently facilitating the process of textbook and instructional software reviews for the Fall 2012 semester. Textbook/instructional software selection is a crucial component in providing students with course information and learning opportunities. The selection process involves faculty from a common discipline who use a rubric to identify strengths of textbooks and instructional software in the areas of: readability, content, quality, authorship, resource materials, and technical considerations. The process will be reviewed by the Instructional Council.

DISTRICT PUBLIC SAFETY

The District Public Safety Department was involved in a best practice visit by Leonard Urban of Henry Ford Community College's (HFCC) Campus Safety Department. The focus was on found property procedures. The discussion also included alternative methods for logging and releasing property turned over to the Safety Department, the time frame to release and discard property, and where to secure recovered property. HFCC Director of Campus Safety and Security Mark Laberge was impressed with WCCCD's Public Safety Department at the Public Safety Forum.



FINANCIAL AID

The District Financial Aid Department and Student Loan Management Center served 1,086 students District-wide at the annual Summer Financial Aid workshops. This outreach opportunity provided students with an opportunity to apply for summer financial aid, receive updates and information regarding financial aid for the 2012-13 award year and ask questions.

CONGRATULATIONS TO OUR MICUP STUDENTS!

Former Michigan College/University Partnership (MICUP) research interns Clarence Hardwick and Modou Gaye have had their first scientific research published and were noted as first authors. These WCCCD students were selected for the MICUP internship at Michigan Technological University (MTU) last spring. Under the mentorship and direction of MTU Professor Hansmann, they researched bio-molecular simulations of proteins. The results were developed and published under the Europhysics Journal of the European Physical Society, EPL, in Jan 2012 This accomplishment is very noteworthy for students yet to obtain their undergraduate degree.

Community college students will have the chance to design robotic rovers in cooperation with NASA. Ninety-two students from schools in 24 states have been selected to travel to a NASA center, including NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Ca., to develop rovers through the National Community College Aerospace Scholars program. The initiative provides hands-on opportunities to inspire interest in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) disciplines.

CORPORATE COLLEGE AT THE EASTERN CAMPUS

Commissioner Tim Killeen, U.S. Congressman Hansen Clarke, State Representative Tim Bledsoe, the University Center, and Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education hosted a public forum this week. The topic was Lake St. Clair, the Detroit River and Homeland Security. The panel members included Wayne County Homeland Security, U.S. Border Patrol, Immigration and Custom Enforcement (ICE) and the U.S. Coast Guard.



Dr. Frank Dunbar led a team of Corporate College at the Eastern Campus faculty to the General Motors (GM) Product Designer Summit. Participating WCCCD faculty included Douglas Payne and Raja Elzein. The intent of the session was to provide a mechanism for key educational decision makers to interface with key GM executives. GM is interested in establishing a designer pipeline to support job opportunities at GM and within the Southeast Michigan design community.

UNIVERSITY CENTER



- The University Center hosted the Eastside Advisory Council meeting today. The Eastside Advisory Council meets bi-monthly to get updates on the University Center and to strengthen our relationship with the Pointes and Harper Woods.
- The University of Michigan- Flint held an Advising Fair to advise students of the partnership programs available at the University Center.
- Ferris State University held an open house with two sessions to inform our students and the public of the partnership program offerings available at University Center. Admissions and counseling staff were onsite to answer questions and to help students with information needed to transfer classes from WCCCD to Ferris State. Through this partnership students are able to earn a bachelor's degree while taking classes locally at the University Center.



For the week of February 29 - March 6, we received 50,151 visits to our website. Visits came from 48 countries. We received 4,899 hits for the academic schedules and 2,234 hits for the college catalog. The average time on the site is 5:26 minutes.




