DISTRICT PUBLIC SAFETY



Members of the District Public Safety Department participated in a active shooting training course designed to address the threat of an active shooter and other violent critical incidents on school grounds, college and university campuses, and the workplace. This one-day course included classroom instruction on active shooter's profile and characteristics they need to have proper response equipment, basic survival tips and debrief about Columbine, Virginia Tech and other schools.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY



You can now protect your personal information electronic devices such as smart phones and tablets in the event they are lost or stolen. The key is to register your device with the manufacturer and/or service provider and install the appropriate app.

For example, according to Apple's website, you can use its iCloud and "Find My iPhone" application to track any of your registered products if they are stolen or lost. Go to the Apple website and sign in at icloud.com or use the "Find My iPhone" app on another device to see your missing iPhone, iPad, iPod touch, or Mac on a map.


STUDENT SUCCESS

MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION

The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education (MIPSE) hosted several organizations this week:

The United States Coast Guard Auxiliary held their monthly meeting to share information from the ٠ National and District levels, and relay information back up the chain of command.



- The Wayne County Sheriff's Department held a Police Officer Motorcycle Training workshop. This two-week course required candidates to complete various courses with their large heavy duty motorcycles. This is an annual update requirement for officers to remain on the patrol.
- Healthlink Medical Transportation held a Train the Trainer: An Instructors Course in Coaching the Emergency Vehicle ۲ Operator (CEVO): Ambulance class. The goal of the CEVO course is to facilitate the student's knowledge of the laws involving the operation of an emergency vehicle, and provide opportunity for practical hands eperiences to evaluate each student's driving abilities.
- The Lincoln Park Citizens Emergency Response Team and other area C.E.R.T. teams held a Helicopter Landing Zone Training Class. They were taught how to select an area for the landing zone, how to mark it for the pilot, and how to properly approach the helicopter.
- Community members were provided a tour of the Downriver Campus and MIPSE. A walk-thru was provided of the Downriver Emergency Responder Training Center to showcase the car, plane and tower burn simulators as well as the classroom capabilities and apparatus bay's equipment selection. After the tour of the training center, visitors were shown the Heinz C. Prechter Educational and Performing Arts Center, Brown and Juanita C. Ford Art Gallery and conference rooms.

College Admissions Representative, hosted an undergraduate admissions recruitment visit at the Western Campus for students interested in their transfer programs.


ART EXPLORATION AT THE WESTERN CAMPUS


LEARNING RESOURCE CENTER


