



New Study Conducted by Michigan State University

New data by Michigan State University indicates you're more likely to find a job with an associate's degree than with an MBA. Key findings from the annual survey by MSU's College Employment Research Institute:

- ♦ The market for associate's degrees shows a strong gain in job opportunities. Employers will increase hiring of new four-year college graduates about five percent in the coming year; demand for graduates with associate's degrees is expected to increase more sharply by about 30% compared to last year's survey.
- ♦ The average starting salary for new graduates with bachelor's degrees is \$37,000, but plenty of graduates with two-year degrees are earning more. New graduates with two-year degrees are earning an average salary of \$34,960, with computer science majors with two-year degrees earning \$39,408, while nursing graduates earned almost the same salary (\$36,927) as the typical bachelor-degree recipient.

Career Programs





The Educational Affairs and Student Service divisions have completed meetings with each campus to discuss career programs. These discussions updated campus administrators and staff current on career program information. The goal is to have a more informed campus team that can explain career information to interested students as they begin to register for Spring 2013 classes. These program offerings can lead to high skill, high wage, and high demand jobs.

Personal Safety While Shopping This Holiday Season



- Do not buy more than you can carry. Plan ahead by taking a friend with you or ask a store employee to help you carry your packages to the car.
- Shop online with companies you know and trust. Check a company's background if you are not familiar with it.
- Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it usually is.
- Save all receipts. Print and save all confirmations from your online purchases. Start a file folder to keep all receipts together and to help you verify credit card or bank statements as they come in.
- Consider alternate options to pay for your merchandise, such as one time or multiuse disposable credit cards or money orders, at online stores and auction sites.
- Wait until asked before taking out your credit card or checkbook. An enterprising thief would love to shoulder surf to get your account information.
- Deter pickpockets. Carry your purse close to your body or your wallet inside a coat or front trouser pocket.
- ♦ Have your keys in hand when approaching your vehicle. Check the back seat and around the car before getting in.
- Do not leave packages visible in your car windows. Lock them in the trunk or, if possible, take them directly home.
- ♦ Tell a security guard or store employee if you see an unattended bag or package. The same applies if you are using mass transit.
- If you are shopping with children, make a plan in case you get separated. Select a central meeting place and make sure they know they can ask mall personnel or store security employees if they need help.
