INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

THE SCHOOL OF CONTINUING EDUCATION AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

The School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development launched the first Certified Associate Project Management (CAPM) Course at the Downtown Campus. This course will prepare participants for a globally recognized certification for project managers. Project management is one of the top skill-sets demanded by organizations around the world. Upon completion of the course participants will be eligible to take the CAPM Certification Examination.



With less than half of the semester remaining, feedback from students and instructors continues to support the success of the Fall 2012 Blackboard 9.1 launch. Many instructors have expressed their appreciation of the innovative tools now available through the learning management system. The ease of importing rich media content such as YouTube videos and Slide Share presentations is among those features receiving the most favorable comments. Also appreciated is the reorganization of tools that moved those previously layered items from the back to the frontend of the Blackboard platform. This change has decreased lost time spent searching for items not readily viewable.

THE MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION



- The District's Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education (MIPSE) hosted Wayne County Department of Public Health employees as they attended a CPR and first aid training workshop. These employees will represent the first line in cases of medical emergencies.
- MIPSE also hosted the District's Public Safety officers for a two-hour first aid refresher training course as part of their Police Authority training.

DISTRICT PUBLIC SAFETY

District Public Safety officers and supervisors were trained to use the Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) system. The District Communication Control Center personnel can now simultaneously display live and recorded video, archive images, and search for images — all while recording multiple video, and dispatching officers to areas of concern. The CCTV training course is designed to give staff the minimum level of proficiency to utilize cameras to provide additional security to our students, faculty, staff and visitors.
