What's New in Distance Learning?

The integration of Banner and Blackboard provides these advantages to its users:




A Shift in Academic Culture:

The New Majority

There is an increasing trend at four-year institutions to engage adjunct faculty. According to an article in the <u>Chronicle of Higher Education</u> (November, 2012), the shift

notes a change in academic culture and expanding roles for adjunct faculty. It also states a progressive increase of contingent faculty in the instructional workforce with an increase of 148% during the period of 1976-2001 as reported by the U.S. Department of Education. While meeting objectives of the student success agenda, higher education is poised to address meeting the needs of a stable contingent workforce while maintaining essential teaching and curriculum standards. The charts show the number of faculty, by faculty employment status: 1976 to 2001.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

1098-T forms have been generated for all students who have a valid social security number on file with the District. The IRS Form 1098-T is issued to those students who had qualified tuition and fee charges in the preceding calendar year. The form is an informational tax document to aid taxpayers in determining whether they are eligible to claim a tax deduction or education tax credit. 1098-T forms are currently being sent via mail to students. In the meantime, students can access the electronic version of their 1098-T form via WebGate.

NEW MILEAGE RATE



Effective January 1, 2013, the business mileage reimbursement rate was increased to 56.5¢ per mile. WCCCD uses the IRS standard mileage rate for reimbursement to employees using personal vehicles for approved business travel.

NURSING PROGRAM ACCREDITATION UPDATE

National League of Nursing Accrediting Commission (NLNAC) Standard 4 highlights the need for students to have



clinical experiences that reflect best practices and nationally established patient health and safety goals. WCCCD has developed and maintained clinical partnerships that will enable our nursing



students to have a wide range of practicum experiences while they are still under the guidance of faculty. This is an effective strategy to apply and analyze what they learn in the classroom which will later translate into what they may encounter as nurses in practice.

The key is for users to understand the implications of sharing particular personal information on any social media site such Facebook. Even though Graph Search is privacy-conscious as Facebook promises, some embarrassing content, or potentially sensitive data could always come up and haunt you.

The training provided onsite leaders and team members the necessary skills to establish and operate a Center for Disease Control Point of Disruption during a declared bioterrorism emergency.

♦ The Wayne County Department of Public Health also held a NIMS Resource Unit Leader Class. This three-day workshop provided an overview of unit leader responsibilities and the planning process to contextualize the resources unit for participants unfamiliar with the planning process or the Incident Command System.

The U.S. Customer and Border Protection conducted a fourday active shooter training workshop. The participants learned about the history of mass killings, initial response to a hostage/barricaded vs. an active shooter, improvised explosive device awareness and rescue first aid to name a few.

Legislative Update







News From Other States: California Governor Jerry Brown has suggested several ways to change community colleges in California. Restricting how many units a person can earn is one. Another is to pay students for finishing their course work. Governor Brown's idea is to kick back money to students who finish their courses with good grades. A unit that now costs students \$49, could get a \$10 rebate of more.

Community Colleges in the News: Jackson Community College (JCC) trustees approved authorization of Jackson Preparatory and Early College (JPEC) charter school. JPEC will serve sixth through 12th grades and add a 13th so students can graduate with a high school diploma and tuition-free JCC associate's degree.

Statewide News: Business leaders of Michigan advocate for increased spending in higher education. Between 2002 and 2012, state spending per student on higher education declined 35% even as public spending per prisoner increased 42%.
