Third-party Payment Process

Fall 2013 registration has begun and students are eagerly registering for classes. It is important that students who receive tuition assistance from third party sponsors provide an authorization immediately after registration. A third-party sponsor is an organization that agrees to pay for all or a portion of a student's cost for attending WCCCD. Students can submit their authorization at the campus and the information will be forwarded to the Bursar's Office for processing. Once the authorization is received by the Bursar's Office, it is validated and processed on the student's account. It is imperative that these authorizations are received in a timely manner in order to avoid cancellation of a student's registration.
