

Math Redesign

Professor John Squires of Chattanooga State University visited with faculty and administrators on redesigning mathematics education based on evidence gathered over years of implementing a technology-based approach to students' progress through mathematics courses.

At WCCCD, we are redesigning math instruction in a pilot that follows an individualized computer-based approach. Professor Squires redesigned a math program that uses technology to focus attention on the skills students need for college-level courses and lets them move at their own pace. The time that students spend at home reviewing lecture videos and completing assignments are key to this model.







SAT Redesign

A recent article in <u>Inside Higher ED</u> entitled "College Board Announces Plans to Redesign the SAT" discussed the impact of SAT redesign and how the changes will center around students work in higher education. SAT outcomes will adhere to the foundation of knowledge and skills that are required for students to be successful in an ambitious effort to further their education.

THE MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION

The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education hosted several organizations this week:

- ♦ The Wayne County Department of Public Health held a one-day workshop titled "Mass Antibiotic Dispensing: Public Information and Communication." This workshop was a collection of presentations, group exercises, discussions, and supporting materials used to provide an introduction to the Strategic National Stockpile.
- ♦ The Wayne County Sheriff's Training Division continued a four-week Jailor Training class. Students will be taught such topics as self-defense, CPR, fire safety, ethics and sexual harassment, cultural diversity, stress management, legal issues, and many other topics. At the conclusion of the class the students will become full-time jailors at one of the county's two jails.
- ♦ The U.S. Customs and Border Protection held a four-day Active Shooter Training workshop. Participants explored the history of mass killings, initial response to a hostage/barricaded vs. an active shooter, improvised explosive device awareness and rescue first aid to name a few.
- ♦ MIPSE held an Automotive Lab Safety and Security Procedures Workshop. Automotive students were given safety tips and learned of WCCCD's security procedures which were presented by Gil Solis from Safety and Compliance.

Romulus schools would pay for all tuition, fees and books for the students. The school board gave their approval to the superintendent to move forward with developing this partnership with WCCCD at the Western campus with classes targeted to begin in the Fall 2013 semester.

Detroit College Scholarship

WCCCD hosted the Detroit College Scholarship meeting which is a partnership that includes the Governor's Office, Skillman Foundation, Broad Foundation, Kresge Foundation, Detroit Parent Network, Public Policy Associates, Detroit Mayor Dave Bing's Office, Detroit Public Schools, and the Detroit Regional Chamber. Governor Snyder announced his intention to create a city-wide college scholarship program. The partners mentioned above have embarked on a campaign to raise the funds necessary to fulfill this pledge. The scholarship will provide tuition assistance to any student who lives in Detroit and graduates from a high school in the city (traditional public, charter or private).
