


UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN-DEARBORN™

WCCCD Nursing Program is a member of the Michigan Council of Nursing Education Administrators (MCNEA) an organization which represents the academic nurse leaders of associate degree and practical nursing programs in Michigan. The goals of MCNEA are to:

- Impact the direction of nursing education in Michigan.
- Monitor the direction of legislative issues regarding health care and nursing.
- Contribute to the professional development of the membership.
- Maintain a communication network for MCNEA members.

WCCCD Dean of Nursing, Gwen Cook, Ph.D., RN, attended the February 28 quarterly meeting in Mt. Pleasant, Michigan. Deans of Nursing from across the state discussed the top item on everyone's agenda – preparing for accreditation through National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission (NLNAC). WCCCD Nursing Program, like other schools attending the meeting, is currently writing their self study. This is a multi-month task that takes a close look at the program's mission and vision as well as, all activities of the program.

MCNEA supports the *Michigan Agenda for Nursing - Actions to Avert a Crisis,* and has sought to address specific concerns related to nursing education. Other news to come as WCCCD Nursing Program is an active partner with this organization.
