New Report – The MCCA Board of Directors endorsed the MCCVLC Next Generation Task Force report. The MCCA and member colleges will move forward on the implementation of the Task Force recommendations including support for funding of the project. The Task Force has agreed to continue as the initial Governing Board for the proof-of-concept pilot project, and will provide updates to the MCCA Board at their future meetings.

New Horizon Report Focuses on Community Colleges A new project of the New Media Consortium (NMC), which produces the Horizon Report each year and the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD) will focus on understanding major trends, challenges and emerging technologies that will likely have an impact on teaching and learning in community colleges.

This recent reading project certainly upholds their mission statement.







THE MICHIGAN INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EDUCATION



The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education hosted several organizations this week:

• The Wayne County Department of Public Health employees attended a CPR and first aid training workshop. They learned basic first aid, CPR, AED and choking emergencies. These employees will represent the first line in cases of medical emergencies.

• The Wayne County Sheriff's Training Unit attended a Concealed Pistol License (CPL) Gun Safety Class. The class addressed loading and unloading, care and cleaning, fundamentals of marksmanship, selfdefense and Michigan Laws pertaining to concealed weapons. Members of the unit also attended a three-day National Institute of Corrections Direct Supervision Course. Participants enhanced their understanding of leadership principles developed to assist them in the day-to-day operations of direct supervision facilities.

The U.S. Custom and Border Protection held a four-day active shooter training workshop. Participants explored the history
of mass killings, initial response to a hostage/barricaded vs. an active shooter, improvised explosive device awareness and
rescue first aid to name a few. Participates spent two days acting out scenarios on the training ground using the tower and
mobile home.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Best Practices to Help Protect Yourself From Online Fraud (Part 1)

- Never reply to e-mail messages that request your personal information. Be very suspicious of any e-mail message from a business or person that asks for your personal information — or one that sends you personal information and asks you to update or confirm it.
- Don't click links in suspicious e-mails. Don't click a link contained in a suspicious message. The link might not be trustworthy. Instead, visit websites by typing their URL into your browser or by using your Favorites link. Do not copy and paste links from messages into your browser.
- Use strong passwords and change them often. If your account allows them, strong passwords combine uppercase and lowercase letters, numbers, and symbols, which make them difficult for other people to guess. Don't use real words. Use a different password for each of your accounts and change them frequently.

LEGISLATIVE CORNER

HOUSE BILL 4212

Some major changes from Governor Snyder's recommendation to the community college appropriation bill.

- Elimination of the \$1.1 million for the VLC enhancements. The House has removed many of the program increases in all of the budgets in order to dedicate more money to roads and other priorities
- Inclusion of new language to restrict the 2% increase to those institutions that have not entered into long-term labor contracts without 10% savings.
- Elimination of the 15% formula component for skilled trades placements and restoration of the "local strategic value" 15% component.

The Legislature will now be on break for two weeks, meaning that the House will not take this to full committee until they get back, and the Senate will not report their bill from subcommittee until they get back the second week of April.
