
TRIO STUDENTS VISIT EASTERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY

At least 40% of all WCCCD students are first generation students.





IN THE NEWS.... COMMUTER RAIL AND LIGHT RAIL

According to an article published this week in the Dearborn Press and Guide MiTrain, a commuter rail project linking Ann Arbor, Westland, Dearborn and New Center in Detroit is in the works. Carmine Palombo, Director of Transportation Planning for the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, said "MiTrain is a planned regional rail link that would connect with the proposed Detroit bus rapid transit service and the potential privately funded M-1 Woodward Avenue Light Rail line Connection. The story is another indication that the Light Rail Technology (LRT) Program, which started this Fall at the Downtown Campus, was timely. Students graduating from the LRT Program will be equipped to seek employment in both the light rail and commuter rail industry as it expands in southeast Michigan and nationally.

LEARNING RESOURCE CENTER

September was National Library Card Sign-Up Month and all students activating new library accounts were entered into a drawing to win a WCCCD bookstore gift card. Stephanie Coffer offered a campus-to-campus challenge that the Learning Resource Center with the most new cards activated would receive free lunch. This enhancement allows the District to be more transparent and is an opportunity to provide accurate checks and balances. This tool is used on an ongoing basis to monitor system activity and audit the system data. For example, access to the IT division was audited this week to ensure that unauthorized access has not been granted to anyone.



THE SCHOOL OF CONTINUING EDUCATION AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT



Through a successful educational partnership with the Detroit Housing Commission, the School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development presented the Silver Circle Music Appreciation Program. This entertaining and fun program was designed to expose participants to variety of musical selections. The history and backgrounds of composers and music artists were also explored.

LEGISLATIVE CORNER

More that 600 Detroit high school students are attending community colleges this fall compliments of the Detroit Scholarship Fund. The scholarship was created by Governor Snyder to provide every young person in Detroit with financial assistance toward a two-year associate degree or technical certificate. The governor's office is helping to fund the program with private donations, and it covers the difference between the full cost of tuition and mandatory fees at five community colleges, and the amount of federal Pell grants offered to students. Participating schools are Wayne County Community College District, Macomb Community College, Schoolcraft College, Oakland Community College and Henry Ford Community College.
