
DISTRICT PUBLIC SAFETY

NURSING PROGRAM NEWS!



Dr. Gwendolyn Cook, Dean of Nursing and faculty members Dr. Caroline Peltz and Matthew Stanley attended a conference titled "Concept-Based Nursing Education: What's all the Buzz About?" The conference was sponsored by the Michigan Council of Nursing Education Administrators of which WCCCD's Nursing Program is a member.

A Nursing Program information meeting was conducted by the nursing administration at the Northwest Campus. Participants who are interested in applying to the RN program learned about the application process and program details.

Students who are applying to the Nursing Program took the HESI Entrance Testing. The standardized exam measures the test taker in a number of subject areas, including reading comprehension, vocabulary, grammar, math, and sciences.





LEGISLATIVE CORNER

Executive Budget Recommendation: Governor Rick Snyder unveiled his FY 2014-15 budget recommendation. For the state's 15 public universities, the Governor recommended a 6.1% increase to operations funding. Overall, the budget would increase public university funding by \$81.9 million, or 5.7% of total funding. Like colleges, universities would continue to receive a mix of General Fund and School Aid Fund revenue.

Concurrent Enrollment Regulations: Representatives met with Senator Booher in regards to his package on three bills, Senate Bills 745-747, that would set parameters for

college courses offered in a high school setting. The bills would also set restrictions regarding what factors a college or university should take into account in setting tuition for such courses, and state legislative intent that tuition should not exceed the in-district rate.

Credit for Military Education: The House Military and Veterans Affairs Committee took testimony on House Bill 5036, which would require community colleges to inform known veterans, military reservists, or active duty military members of what options they have related to military transcripts and academic credit. This bill would not mandate that credit be given to the student; just that they would be informed of any options they have at that college.

Pell Grant Program: The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) provided welcome news for the Pell Grant in the form of updated budget estimates for 2014-2024. The CBO now projects total funding needs for the Pell Grant Program to be lower in the current fiscal year and for the next few years thereafter than previously estimated. The current surplus will remain through FY 2015— a year longer than previously projected— and FY 2016 has a more manageable shortfall of \$990 million. For FY 2017 and beyond, the shortfall remains between \$3-7 billion per year.

Virtual Learning Collaborative Update: Key Trends in Educational Technology— The annual survey of educational technology trends and how they impace higher education was released this week by the New Media Consortium. Those technology trends that we should see adoption of within the next year or less included flipped classrooms and learning analytics. Technologies that will see adoption in two to three years include 3D printing and gamification. Those technologies will see adoption in four to five years were virtual assistants and quantified self.

Michigan New Jobs Training Program (MNJTP): Legislation Introduced in U.S. Senate for Federal Match to MNJTP—As previously reported, U. S. Senator Debbie Stabenow introduced S1795, the New Skills for New Jobs Act, which would create a federal credit to match the Michigan New Jobs Training Program and similar programs in other states By matching the state contribution, the bill could double the number of eligible companies and workers that can participate in the MNJTP.



Did you know?

Women in the Millennial generation are closing the gender wage gap-at least for now. In 2012 women ages from 25 to 34 earned 93% of what their male counterparts made, up from 89% in 2005. That is significant better than the 84% wage gap for all women in 2012, according to Pew Research survey release in 2013. With more education. greater work force participation and an increased presence in more lucrative occupations, women have seen their median wages rise by 25% over the past 30 years. Meanwhile, the median hourly wage for men decreased 4% from 1980 to 2012. In 2013, female millennials were more likely than male

OFFICE OF ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY



This week, students participated in a Museum Crawl and toured the Motown Museum, The Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History and the Detroit Historical Museum. Each museum provided a guided tour of its artifacts and special exhibitions. Students stood in the studio where Stevie Wonder, Smokey Robinson and the Supremes recorded songs at the Motown Museum. They walked the streets of old Detroit and toured the new Kid Rock Music Lab, the Doorway to Freedom Detroit and the Underground Railroad exhibits at the Historical Museum. Finally, students were treated to the "And Still We Rise" and the Americans Science and Technology high tech permanent exhibit at the Charles H. Wright Museum.

"Celebration! Black History Month" continues to be a success District-wide with campuses presenting national speakers, museum visits, bus tours, movies, storytellers, genealogical workshops, book club discussions, and the Forecast Overflow exhibit in the Brown and Juanita C. Ford Art Galley.

Michigan was known as "Slave Haven." This reputation was the results of the number of operatives who helped freedom seekers to obtain freedom in the city or in neighboring Canada, just across the river, Conductors, operators and stations existed throughout the city and surrounding counties.

Students took a bus ride through the streets of Detroit on the Underground Railroad, stopping at the Gateway to Freedom, an Underground Railroad Monument located at Hart Plaza, the Finney Barn that was used to harbor fugitive slaves on Griswold and Capital Park streets, and the home sites of William Lambert and George DeBaptiste UGRR conductors.
