Global Conversations SPEAKER SERIES

WCCCD's Division of Student Services in partnership with the Institute for Social Progress and the School of Continuing Education presented Dr. Andrew Grant-Thomas. Dr. Thomas's conversation was titled "Race, Implicit Bias, and the Future of Multiracial America." Dr. Andrew Grant-Thomas is a nationally recognized race and ethnic studies scholar who was worked with leading universities on major civil rights efforts for more than two decades. Dr. Grant-Thomas was a key member of the Harvard Civil Rights Project/(now UCLA Civil Rights Project), which is considered to be the foremost university based institute focusing on integration and racial equity in U.S. public education. He formerly was the deputy Director of the Kirwan Institute for the Study of Race and Ethnicity, where he directed numerous major civil rights educational projects, and he was also editor-in-chief of the Kirwan Institute's journal "Race/Ethnicity." Dr. Grant-Thomas is currently the national Director of Programs at the Proteus Fund, a national foundation committed to advancing social justice through democracy, human rights, and peace.




Veterans Affairs



INSTITUTIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

According to the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), measuring dual enrollments, where high school students can earn both high school credit and college credit simultaneously, approximately 82% of high schools reported that students were enrolled in dual enrollment courses. WCCCD offers courses to high school students through it's Dual Enrollment Program in both academic (56%) and career/technical (44%) focus areas. 




LEGISLATIVE CORNER

Budgets Finalized: The Legislature finalized House Bill 5314, the omnibus funding bill for Michigan schools, including community colleges.

Enrollment in Distance Education Courses by State (Fall 2012): The U.S. Department of Education has released the data from the first Integrated Postsecondary Data System survey of enrollment in distance learning courses, collected in Fall 2012. Of the 21.1 million students enrolled in Title IV institutions in Fall 2012, 12.5% were enrolled exclusively in distance learning courses, 13,3% were in some distance education courses, and 74.2 were not enrolled in distance education.



BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF THE JOBLESS RATES FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGES





CENTER FOR DISTANCE EDUCATION




Starbucks has recently announced an innovative new partnership with Arizona State's Distance Learning division aimed at enabling its employees to earn a degree in any field while continuing to work for the

company. The program is designed to replace the current plan which offers employees up to \$1,000 per year for programs at the University of Seattle or Strayer University, and instead the joint partnership between Starbucks and Arizona State will provide \$6,500 towards the total \$20,000 tuition over two years. Employees are expected to qualify for a full Pell Grant which would cover the reminder of their tuition, and they are under no obligation to remain at Starbucks after completing their degree. The result of this partnership is expected to both drastically increase the enrollment in Arizona State's online programs, as well as increasing access to education among low-wage workers.

Trends in student enrollment in distance learning courses have changed over the last several years. At one point students were taking on average three online classes, that trend has moved downward. While there are now almost four times as many students taking distance learning courses, the number of courses each student is taking has decreased to just over one per student. What the data does not tell us is why this trend is occurring, as there could be multiple factors involved. Further study is needed in this area.
