













ANNUAL RECOGNITION DINNER




Student Tracking Delivers Results!

According to a recent edition in this year's Forbes online periodical, it was stated that workforce development was one of the "Top Issues Facing Higher Education in 2014" quoting:

"Workforce development is taking on greater importance as employers are once again hiring but they are still having difficulty finding applicants with needed skills. This is creating dialogue around America's 'skills gap' and the need for higher education to do a better job of preparing future workers. Meanwhile, business and industry remain largely on the sidelines in terms of efforts to increase employee degree completion."

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY PROCESS IMPROVEMENTS WITH BANNER FUNCTIONALITIES

Representatives from the Divisions of Information Technology (IT) and Finance visited Washtenaw Community College to review and understand the use of the Xtender Solution software. The team met with the accounts payable and IT teams to discuss the different phases of implementation, process enhancements, system controls, system set up and benefits of the system.

LEGISLATIVE CORNER

In District Tuition for Veteran: On May 7, 2014, the House Military and Veterans Affairs Committee reported out House Joint Resolution M, which would amend the constitution to require colleges to charge only in-district tuition to all veterans regardless of their residency status. The Michigan Community College Association remains strongly opposed to this legislation, although we remain hopeful that the bill sponsor remains open to a compromise that would alleviate the fiscal impact to colleges. The resolution now goes to the full House of Representatives, where it will require two-thirds support.



Community College Budgets Advance: Both the House of Representatives and the full Senate this week approved their initial versions of budgets for Michigan community colleges. These versions generally mirror those that had come out of the Appropriations Committees, with both chambers recommending total funding of \$371,524,900.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM PLANNING MORE NEW CAREER PROGRAMS ANNOUNCED FOR THE FALL SEMESTER!

IMPORTANT NOTICE! PRIOR APPROVAL FORMS AND TRAVEL EXPENSE REPORTS

Time is winding down for the 2013-14 fiscal year. If you were approved for professional development travel, you must submit your Travel Expense Report, even if there is no reimbursement to you. For audit purposes, your Prior Approval and Travel Expense Report is required documentation for our records. Travel Expense Reports are due within ten days of your

return from an approved professional development event, unclaimed expense reimbursements may be forfeited if not submitted within the proper timeframe.

INSTITUTIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

The Association of Institutional Research (AIR) provides online professional development courses for institutional researchers. Academy courses build institutional research skills needed to support data-informed decision making. The courses are accessible without travel or special software, and are designed for busy employees who need on-the-job and on-the-go training.



The Academy is committed to:

- Building capacity in institutional research and data use at two-year institutions by offering a certificate focused on the institutional research discipline
- Offering courses accessible without travel for busy employees that can receive on-the-go training
- Developing Scholarships for attendance that are based on institutional nominations



This program will be piloted in Fall 2014 with courses offered through the Health Sciences Division at the Northwest Campus. At the end of the two-year program, students will receive an associate's degree and have the skills to apply directly for positions assisting an Anesthesiologist with patient care and clinical procedures. Jobs in this field are available in a variety of locations and specializations, including the operating room, outpatient care, labor and delivery, and the emergency room.

DISTRICT ENGAGEMENT WORKSHOP



Updates include new programs, courses, transfer agreement and financial aid disclosures.










SISTERS ACQUIRING FINANCIAL EMPOWERMENT

CONTINUOUS QUALITY IMPROVEMENT

The Continuous Quality Improvement Audit Center collects, reviews and conducts monthly reconciliations and on-going audits of all District data. A systematic approach is used to procure data from multiple sources, allowing for collective knowledge through accountability and transparency. The Office of Accountability and Transparency with a team consisting of individuals from Information Technology, Administration and Finance, Institutional Effectiveness and Educational Affairs were assigned to audit the Summer 2014 Faculty Load Report. Data was reviewed and documented for a full report.
