Division of Administration and Finance

The Student Refund Management taskforce attended a kick-off meeting for the implementation of the Higher One Refund Management Solution project. Higher One provides alternatives for how students receive their financial aid refunds and is utilized by nearly every community college in Michigan and more than 700 colleges across the United States.

Beginning in January 2015, students will have three options for receiving their refunds:

- 1. Continue to receive a paper check as in the past, only now the check will come from Higher One.
- 2. Receive their refund via direct deposit to an existing bank account they may have, typically within 5-7 days after vouchers expire.

3. Open a Higher One checking (debit card) account and receive the refund, typically within 3-5 days after vouchers expire. The Higher One checking account will be offered to ALL students, has no minimum balance, requires no background or credit check, and has no monthly fees. All fees can be avoided if students use the card as directed.


Students will receive an invitation to open a Higher One checking account in early January via U.S. postal mail.

The Purchasing Department, pursuant to Board policy, maintains the sole authority and responsibility for the purchase and selection of qualified vendors for the procurement of supplies, materials, software, furniture, equipment, printing and services needed by District departments.

The selection of qualified vendors is performed by using a fair and competitve buying process. This process insures that goods and services procured for the District are the best quality at the best price. Our vendor selection is primarily based on the lowest responsive bidder. However, in the case of a sole source supplier or if our committee determines that the best price is not necessarily the best quality, the District reserves the right to select other than the low vendor/bidder without the lowest price.

Black Friday Safety Tips

This year many shoppers will be out early to find those big bargains on Black Friday or online for Cyber Monday, but the criminals will be out too. NCPC has 10 great tips to help you shop safely while getting those great holiday bargains hroughout the shopping season.



- Do not buy more than you can carry. Plan ahead by taking a friend with you ask a store employee to help you carry your packages to the car.
- Shop online with companies you know and trust. Check a company's background if you are not familiar with it. Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it usually is.
- Save all receipts. Print and save all confirmations from your online purchases. Start a file folder to keep all receipts together and to help you verify credit card or bank statements as they come in.
- Consider alternate options to pay for your merchandise, such as onetime or multiuse disposable credit cards or money orders, at online stores and auction sites.
- Deter pickpockets. Carry your purse close to your body or your wallet inside a coat or front trouser pocket.
- Have your keys in hand when approaching your vehicle. Check the back seat and around the car before getting in.
- Do not leave packages visible in your car windows. Lock them in the trunk or, if possible, take them directly home.
- If you are shopping with children, make a plan in case you get separated. Select a central meeting place and make sure they know they can ask mall personnel or store security employees if they need help.
