

Vice President Biden Announces Recipients of \$450 Million of Job-Driven Training Grants!

Wayne County Community College District receives prestigious federal Trade Adjustment Assistance Community College and Career Training (TAACCCT) grants through its School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development programs.

Wayne County Community College District is receiving a \$2.5 million to train unemployed veterans and other eligible workers in cybersecurity. The awards will be used to support community colleges in developing partnerships with employers to educate and train individuals for in-demand jobs through the School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development.

This award is part of more than \$450 million in grants given to community colleges around the country in the final round of the four-year, nearly \$2 billion in the TAACCCT initiative to assist in expanding the ability of the community college to provide training programs in partnership with local employers.

According to a White House Press Release:

"The grants will provide community colleges and other eligible institutions of higher education with funds to partner with employers to expand and improve their ability to deliver education and career training programs that will help job seekers get the skills they need for in-demand jobs in industries like information technology, health care, energy, and advanced manufacturing."



Reaching the Community to Create an Awareness

The School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development partnered with the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America (SDAA) to co-sponsor a Sickle Cell Awareness and Myth Dispelling Walk in partnership with DIPLOMAT and Children's Hospital of Michigan. There were more than 1,200 participants at this first Annual Sickle Cell Walk. This year marks the beginning of a great partnership and the success of the Michigan Chapter, Inc Sickle Cell Walk.

What you should know about Sickle Cell?

Sickle cell is an inherited blood disorder that affects red blood cells that have a difficult time passing through small blood vessels. When sickle-shaped cells block small blood vessels, less blood can reach that part of the body. The sickle cell disease occurs among about 1 out of every 500 Blacks or African-American births. There is currently no universal cure for sickle cell disease; 1 out of every 36,000 Hispanic-American births, and affects 90,000 to 100,000 Americans.

The School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development and SDAA look forward to strengthening our relationship. Discussions have taken place to present workshops to provide information to families coping with a family member that has sickle cell. Other topics will include treatment, affects, resources and services available.




Travel Request Process

Learning Outside the Classroom






Learning can become inherently spontaneous and studentcentered when moved from the confines of the classroom into the world at large. From the collaborative learning atmosphere

Division of Human Resources

Employee Tuition Reimbursement Policy



Tuition assistance is available to full and part-time staff; and full-time faculty under the guidelines and terms of the appropriate bargaining agreement or District policy.

The employee must successfully complete each course and remain a regular employee and be active on the payroll for the entire term in which tuition assistance is provided. If the employee should for any reason not meet these requirements, the employee forfeits the tuition assistance benefit and is required to reimburse the District for the full amount. No reimbursement will be made for other fees, including lab fees, parking fees, books, school supplies, etc.

- 1. Credit Course Tuition assistance for credit courses from accredited colleges and universities are administered by the Human Resources Office. These courses must be taken after normal working hours. The employee must have an Associate of Arts Degree or equivalent hours. These courses must be courses that are not offered by WCCCD to be reimbursed. The course must be career-oriented, required as part of a degree program and be related to work within the District environment.
- 2. Under Federal Law, graduate tuition assistance is considered taxable income. Therefore, when an employee possessing an undergraduate degree takes a course which could be taken for graduate credit, the tuition assistance for that course is taxed.
- 3. Tuition reimbursement will be awarded only when an official final grade report of "satisfactory" or better and an original fee receipt indicating a zero balance has been received.





A newly revamped resource will help colleges and universities assess the quality of their online offerings. The Online Learning Consortium (OLC), formerly the Sloan Consortium, has



introduced a new version of its Quality Scorecard for Online Programs that examines nine broad areas, including institutional, faculty, student and tech-

nology support, teaching and learning, course development and structure, social and student engagement and evaluation and assessment. In total there are 75 indicators by which a program is evaluated and scored from deficient (zero points) to exemplary (three points). A total of 225 points is possible. The new edition of the scorecard has five new indicators and a higher score potential. Users of the quality scorecard cite it as a useful model by which to identify areas of strength and areas for improvement in their online programs.

When Was the Last Time You Were Online?

According to the United Nations Broadband Report (2014), nearly half of the world's population is online. The use of wireless (mobile) broadband has far surpassed fixed connections allowing users the freedom to access the internet from more locations. Some of the highlights of the report are:



- * More than 40% of the world's people are already online, with the number of Internet users rising from 2.3 billion in 2013 to 2.9 billion by the end of this year.
- * The popularity of broadband-enabled social media applications continues to soar, with 1.9 billion people now active on social networks.
- * The Republic of Korea continues to have the world's highest household broadband penetration at over 98%, up from 97% last year.
- * Monaco now surpasses last year's champion, Switzerland, as the world leader in fixed broadband penetration, at over 44% of the population.
- * There are now four economies (Monaco, Switzerland, Denmark, Netherlands) where penetration exceeds 40%, up from just one (Switzerland) in 2013.
- * In total, there are now 77 countries where over 50% of the population is online, up from 70 in 2013.
- * The top 10 countries for Internet use are all located in Europe, with Iceland ranked first in the world with 96.5% of people online.

Microsoft Certification

Exams for two kinds of Microsoft certification can now be taken online from remote locations. In an agreement between Pearson VUE, which provides computer-based testing for a number of different certification programs, and Microsoft, exams for the Microsoft Certified Professional and Microsoft Technology Associate certification can be taken via "online proctoring" as well as the traditional on-site testing locations already available. The partnership means that certification candidates who do not live within easy travel distance of a live testing center can take them in their homes or office, all while protecting the integrity of the certification process. Candidates for the online exams will pay the same price as those taking onsite exams. Certain security arrangements will be required for individuals who want to take the exams from their homes or offices. For one thing, a clean, private room or office with desk space must be clearly visible via webcam. Candidates will be supervised in real time for the exams by Pearson VUE employees using webcams, microphones and other security protocols.

The Continuous Quality Improvement Audit Center collects, reviews and conducts monthly reconciliations and on-going audits of all District data. A systematic approach is used to procure data from multiple sources, allowing for collective knowledge through accountability and transparency. The "Train the Trainer "sessions continue to move forward with document retention training for the District. Jeff Anderson, Jara Tekleab and Syed Hussain have reviewed and discussed multiple forms of records that play an important role in the District's compliance of its record keeping.

Opportunities for Shared Services

WCCCD is exploring the idea of sharing services across the District. Like many colleges and universities across the nation, we are researching the possibility of shared services to financially sustain our organizational structure as an institution. One institution spent two years researching this initiative and found that by using a shared service model between the Divisions of Human Resources, Finance and Information Technology, they would save \$13 to \$17 million annually. They realigned and improved their processes, tightened their organizational structure and technology-enabled efficiencies. WCCCD will continue to review best practices for shared service opportunities and align them with our strategic goals and outcomes.

New Legislation Impacting Pharmacy Technology

Last week, new legislation was passed that will have a tremendous influence in the field of pharmacy technology. Senate Bill (SB) 92, which adds mandatory licensure for pharmacy technicians to the Michigan Public Health Code, was signed into law on September 23, 2014 by Michigan Govenor Rick Snyder. The bill becomes Public Act 285 of 2014, and it will likely take effect December 23, 2014.

University Center West

Members of the Mary Ellen Stempfle University Center-West (UC-West) leadership team met on the University of Michigan-Dearborn campus with the intent of furthering our university partner conversation that began in July. The University of Michigan-Dearborn (UofM) College of Engineering and Computer Science team was led by Tony England, Dean, Dr. Keshav Varde, Associate Dean, Jung Koral and Dr. Lisa Remsing as well as faculty from the College of Engineering and Computer Science: Dr. Ben Li and Armen Zakarian. Dr. Frank Dunbar, Dr. Harvey Dorrah and Jeff Anderson represented WCCCD. Topics of discussion included offering U of M engineering classes at UC-West and a complete review of course credit given to WCCCD students who transfer to U of M-Dearborn.





Partnership Opportunites

Orlando Wilkins and Rev. Frank Raines, III met with Rev. Dr. Robert Brumfield at the Mary Ellen Stempfle University Center. Dr. Brumfield, Senior Pastor of Oak Grove AME Church and Dean of African American Methodist Ministers for Michigan, is interested in collaborating with WCCCD on career and academic program opportunities for community residents. Dr. Brumfield is also interested in further discussions on advanced degree programs opportunities offered through WCCCD's university partner degree programs.







Faculty Salutations

Legislative Corner

Michigan New Jobs Training Program: Last week, the Senate Education Committee took more testimony and also unanimously reported out on Senate Bill 1074, which encompasses our proposed changes to the Michigan New Jobs Training Program (MNJTP). We expect the bill to pass the full Senate this coming week.

Baccalaureate Authorization: Last week, the Michigan Competitiveness Committee held the first of two hearings on House Bill 4148. The bill would expand community college baccauaureate authority to several additional fields, including nursing, allied health, information technology, ski area management, and manufacturing technology.

Veterans Status on Applications: The House Military and Veterans Affairs Committee voted out two bills affecting community colleges. House Bill 5035 would amend the Community College Act to require colleges to ask about military service on college applications.

State Authorization Update: Conversations are now ongoing with the Governor's Office regarding proposed legislation that would allow the state of Michigan to enter into the MHEC-State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA). The State of Michigan's Licensing and Regulations Agency (LARA) has been designated by the Governor's Office as the Portal Agency for the SARA.

Federal Work Study Program

The Federal Work Study Program, which provides many on/off campus job opportunities, held a Job Fair this week. This program was a huge success with lots of student involvement. WCCCD has many exciting partners including the Salvation Army, YMCA, and Detroit Parent Network. Taking advantage of our off-site partnerships allows our students to gain valuable and flexible professional experience.
