

63% of Teens Use Email, Text, and Facebook to Communicate

Teens are more likely than any other age group to use text messaging, Facebook, and Twitter. They are also more likely to communicate through a greater number of channels on a daily basis, picking the right channel based on speed, convenience, and privacy. When it comes to marketing communication preferences, however, teens aren't that much different from the rest of us. In fact, teens and adults alike said that they prefer email over other channels for most marketing communications.

Furthermore, while teens have historically used emerging channels like text and social media more than older consumers, the reality is that all age groups are increasing their use of these channels. Between 2008 and 2012, even consumers over the age of 45 have significantly increased their preference for using text and social media when communicating with friends.



Legislative Corner

Senate Bill NO. 223 Introduced by Senators Warren, Whitmer, Hood, Young, Gregory, Bieda, Johnson, Hopgood, Smith and Hunter. This Bill is called the Michigan Higher Education Grant Act. This bill will establish an educational grant program for eligible resident students who attend public community colleges and universities in this state; to provide for the administration of the program; to create the Michigan higher education grant trust fund; and to provide for the powers and duties of certain state governmental officers and entities.

The authority shall administer the Michigan Higher Education Grant Program. The authority shall do all of the following:

- (a) Award grants to eligible students under this act.
- (b) Develop a grant agreement to be entered into by a grant recipient and the authority that contains the terms of a grant made under this act and the rights and obligations of the grant recipient and the authority.
- (c) Conduct periodic audits of grant recipients to ensure compliance with the terms of the grant agreement and take necessary steps to enforce the terms of the grant agreement.
- (d) Promulgate any rules that it determines are necessary to implement and administer this act under the administrative procedures act of 1969.

Closed Circuit Television

The purpose of Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) monitoring of public areas on/around campuses is to deter crime and to assist in protecting the safety of our students, faculty, staff, guests and our neighbors as well as college property. A standard is in place and helps ensure consistency in the use of this system allowing all cameras to be available for use in emergency situations. Cameras on this system are able to be viewed by District Police Authority. The recordings are most often used to gather information through reviews of historical images. District Police Authority officers have been fully trained through the State of Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards (MCOLES) and have full arrest powers.

Courts and Law Enforcement Management Information System

District Police Authority staff met with retired Detroit Police Lieutenant Larry Adams to discuss obtaining the Courts and Law Enforcement Management Information System (CLEMIS) report writing system. The key principle of CLEMIS is sharing data between law enforcement agencies in a county. Police and public safety agencies from multiple cities, villages and townships provide law enforcement information to the CLEMIS database and enjoy the benefits of having access to this data.



Meet Officer Sheree Willis Johnson

Officer Sheree Willis Johnson graduated from the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy in 1977. Following graduation, she was assigned to the 11th Precinct where she worked patrol for five years. In 1982, she was assigned to work the Morality



Squad. In 1985, she was transferred to the Eastern Operations Bureau. In 1994, she was transferred to the First Precinct Patrol Unit and later worked in the Executive Protection Unit. Her assignment was protection for the Honorable Judge Trudy Duncombe Archer, wife of the Honorable Mayor Dennis Archer. After serving eight years with Executive Protection, she was transferred to the Telephone Crime Reporting Unit and Auto Theft. She was certified as a Law Enforcement Information Network operator. In October 2012, after 35 years of policing, she retired. She recently joined the WCCCD Police Authority Department.

Project Win-Win began in 2009 with 61 colleges in nine states. Round one of the Michigan Project Win-Win resulted in an increase of nearly 2,000 awarded associate's degrees last year. WCCCD is one of 12 Michigan community colleges participating in Round 2 of the project. Project Win-Win's purpose is to identify former students whose records qualified them for degrees, as well as identify former students whose records indicated that they were within striking distance of an associate's degree to complete a few required credits and earn a degree. 
Michigan Center for Student Success 2014 Student Success Summit

Michigan Colleges and Universities Having Increased Default Rates- Except WCCCD!



On Wednesday, September 24, 2014, the <u>Detroit Free Press</u> released an article that displayed all Michigan colleges and universities having increased default rates. Increased rates could ultimately place schools at risk of losing the ability to offer students Title IV scholarships, which includes; Pell, SEOG, and federal student loans. However, WCCCD is the only institution reported to have seen a decrease in its default rate. This drastic decrease is due to the implementation of the Student Loan Management Center and as a result of the comprehensive Loan Default Management Plan implemented by the Financial Aid Office. WCCCD's rate is now lower than the national average and most institutions in this area.

Best Practice Visit to Everett Community College



CAMPUS STEPS



According to the latest data from the American School Counselor Association, there's a single school counselor for every 471 students in this country. The typical student may get only a few minutes with an advisor over the course of his or her high school experience. A new program hopes to help pick up some of the advising slack by guiding students through tasks related to getting into college. Campus Steps is a free matchmaking application that helps students identify appropriate colleges to apply to based on self-reported data, such as academic achievements, assessment scores and future goals. The database from which it draws matches includes more than 8,500 public and private four-year universities, community colleges and trade and vocational schools.

Advocates for students with disabilities and groups representing colleges and universities are sparring over federal legislation that would set new standards for accessible technology on campuses. At issue is a four-page provision in Senator Tom Harkin's massive proposal to rewrite the Higher Education Act that would require a federal board to establish guidelines for evaluating whether instructional materials and other technology used on campuses are accessible to students with disabilities. Colleges and universities would have to either use only instructional materials that conform to the guidelines or assure the education department that they are providing disabled students with materials that are "substantially equivalent" to those provided to their non-disabled peers.

Technology on Campus

WCCCD is in the process of increasing Wi-Fi access throughout all campus locations. This upgrade in technology comes at a time when students and faculty are increasing the use of electronic devices on campuses. A recent survey by Pearson Education discovered that the majority of students use laptops or smartphones for school, but many believe that electronic tablets will change the future of education. Eighty-two percent of students surveyed believe that tablets encourage students to buy electronic books and make learning more fun. Some other interesting findings from the report include:

- 54% of college students use a single mobile device during a typical school day
- 9% use three or more devices during a typical school day
- 89% use a laptop every week for school work
- 56% use a smartphone every week for school work
- 33% use a tablet every week for school work
- 96% have wireless Internet access at home
- 91% have wireless Internet access at school






Program Review Data: 2013-14 Awards Conferred




In Celebration of 50 Years
