
District administrators met with representatives from Central Michigan University to discuss possible future projects.



Legislative Corner

Community College Day Coming Up on May 7:

This is a hands-on advocacy day for community colleges, the purpose being to bring presidents, trustees, senior administrators, and even students to Lansing to highlight the important work of community colleges across the state. In addition to a reception in the Capitol from 11:00 AM - 1:00 PM featuring the Henry Ford College culinary arts program, we are encouraging colleges to make individual appointments with your legislators,





North Carolina Bill Could Shift Cost of Remedial Education Back to the Counties:

The bill would require each county to pay the cost of community college remediation, and applies to students who graduated from a North Carolina high school in the past two years. The financial burden statewide is estimated at \$24 million a year.

Harper College Launches Scholarship to Make Two Years Free:

The Illinois community college joins a growing number of two-year institutions that are providing scholarships to qualifying recent high school graduates. High school students will qualify if they attain at least a "C" grade, perform community service and graduate high school on time. Students also will need to maintain similar requirements while attending Harper to receive the four semesters of free tuition. College officials estimate the program will cost \$600,000 to \$900,000 per year.

Instructional Supply Timeline for Fall 2015





Program Outcomes Data and Survey Analysis

Program Outcomes- Veterinary Technology

According to the American Veterinary Medical Association outcomes must be measured, analyzed, and considered to improve the program. New graduates must have the basic scientific knowledge, skills, and values to provide entry-level health care, independently, at the time of graduation.

✓ Graduates of WCCCD's Veterinary Technology Program have consistently exceeded the national average on the Veterinary Technician National Examination (VTNE). Their average pass rate is 92% or greater.

Downriver Campus Network Infrastructure Upgrade Status


The WCCCD Wide-Area Network project upgrades the network infrastructure in the data center and at each campus. The infrastructure upgrade enables high speed Wi-Fi Internet access throughout the entire district. It provides the advanced network platform that allows telephone calls to be carried on the data network, eliminating the need for a separate phone network.

The Downriver Campus upgrade is nearing completion. Each data closet has new 50 micron fiber data uplinks to the main distribution closet.



The new Power over Ethernet Cisco 3850 switches have been installed. New Liebert UPS/Battery Backup power supplies have been installed in each data closet. With this network upgrade, the Downriver campus will be ready for the implementation of the new VoIP telephone system.

We continue to make progress with the REBUILD grant. The consortium of WCCCD, University of Detroit Mercy, Marygrove College and Wayne State University has been awarded \$21.2 million over five years by the National Institute of Health (NIH) to implement a program encouraging more undergraduate students from underrepresented and economically disadvantaged backgrounds to pursue careers in biomedical research.
