
Program Review Data

Center for Learning Technology

WCCCD's Center for Learning Technology encourages faculty to provide the best online classroom environment for learning as possible. It is up to the instructor to guide the communication in class. Having students post 2-3 responses, questions, or comments to a reading assignment or to a question posed by the faculty is more focused than simply requiring that students post 2-3 times to the discussion each week.


Cisco VolP Project Update

What's Happening Now?


Phase I of the VoIP project is underway at the Northwest Campus. The Siemens phones are being replaced with Cisco 8861 phones. The Cisco phone is configured to only provide the same current features and functionalities of the existing Siemens phone. A basic training on how to guide and an overview of the Cisco 8861 phone was provided to staff. A total of eight training sessions over a period of two days were available to ensure all staff members at the campus participated.



The VoIP technology has many advanced and sophisticated features that the District can utilize to provide an efficient and managed communication platform. The Chancellor and the Executive Team will discuss and decide which features to implement based on the District's need.




Human Resources Compliance

Students are currently enrolled in a Psychology 101 section.






Surgical First Assistant Student Hired and Working in the Community




