Romulus High School: Early College Program

Thirty-four Romulus High School students enrolled in the Early College Program received their high school diploma. These students have one more year of study with WCCCD at the Western Campus and will be graduating from WCCCD in 2016.



High School Partners – Dual Enrollment Program Graduations

Dr. Sandra Robinson and Orlando Wilkins represented the District at Chandler Park Academy's Graduation. Twenty-five students out of 140 graduates were enrolled in the dual enrollment program with WCCCD, including two class officers, and half of the dual enrollment graduates received recognition as honor students.

Veteran Affairs Grants Blanket Waiver on In-State Tuition Requirement

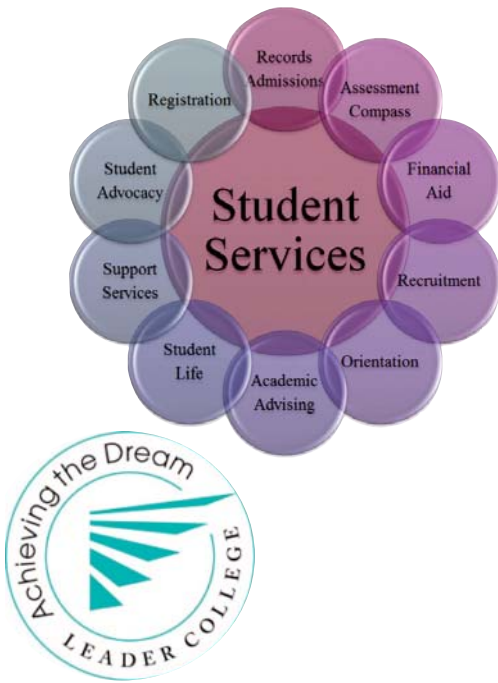

IT Transformation Plan: VoIP Deployment Project Downriver Campus

The Downriver Campus VoIP phone training is complete and phone deployment is underway. The new Cisco 8861 phones are being rolled out by department. This phased approach will be completed by next week. As the phones are installed, the data closet supporting the phones and the computers are being switched over to the new Cisco 3850 network switches. The 3850 is a high performance power over Ethernet switch that powers the phones and manages all data traffic. This new switch technology will also play an important role in managing WiFi access as coverage is expanded throughout the District.

PrinterLogic

The Division of Information Technology (IT) is currently looking at Printer Logic, a web-based printer management solution. Printer Logic is on-site web application that simplifies the management, migration and provisioning of printers. This product will allow for single click printer installation and print driver updates.

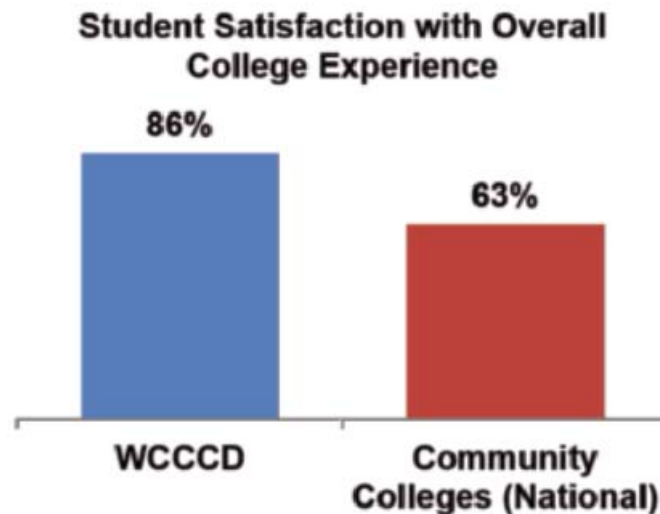




STUDENT SATISFACTION

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness continuously evaluates student satisfaction to identify students' perceptions and overall satisfaction levels with services that impact their college experiences.

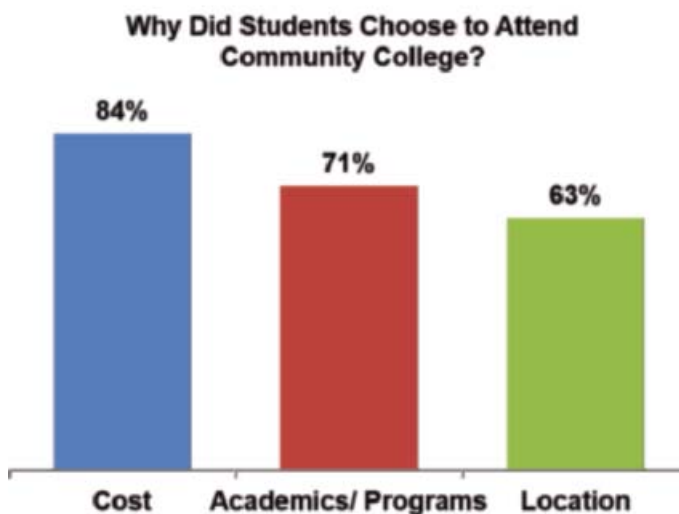

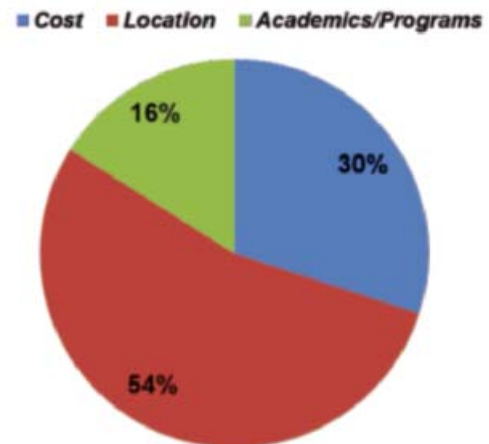

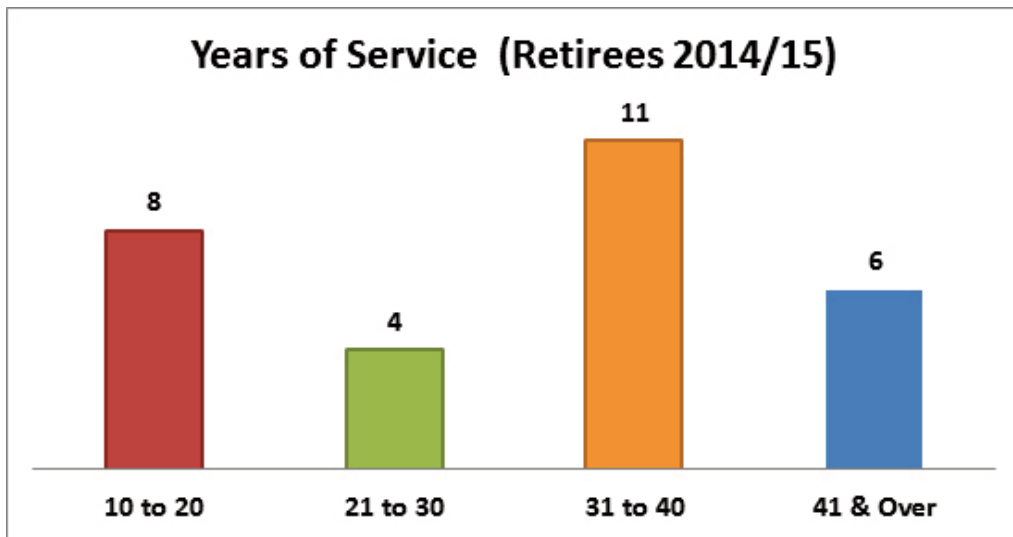

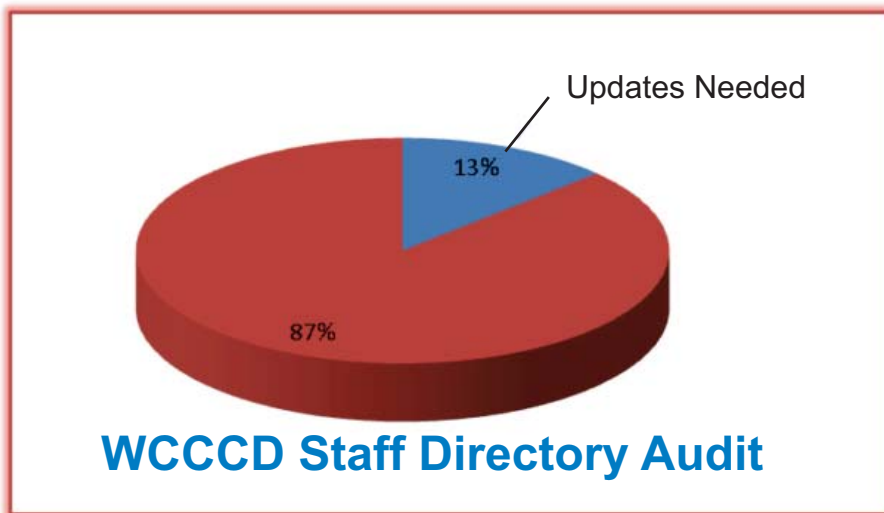


Office of Accountability and Transparency

Anesthesia Technology Program

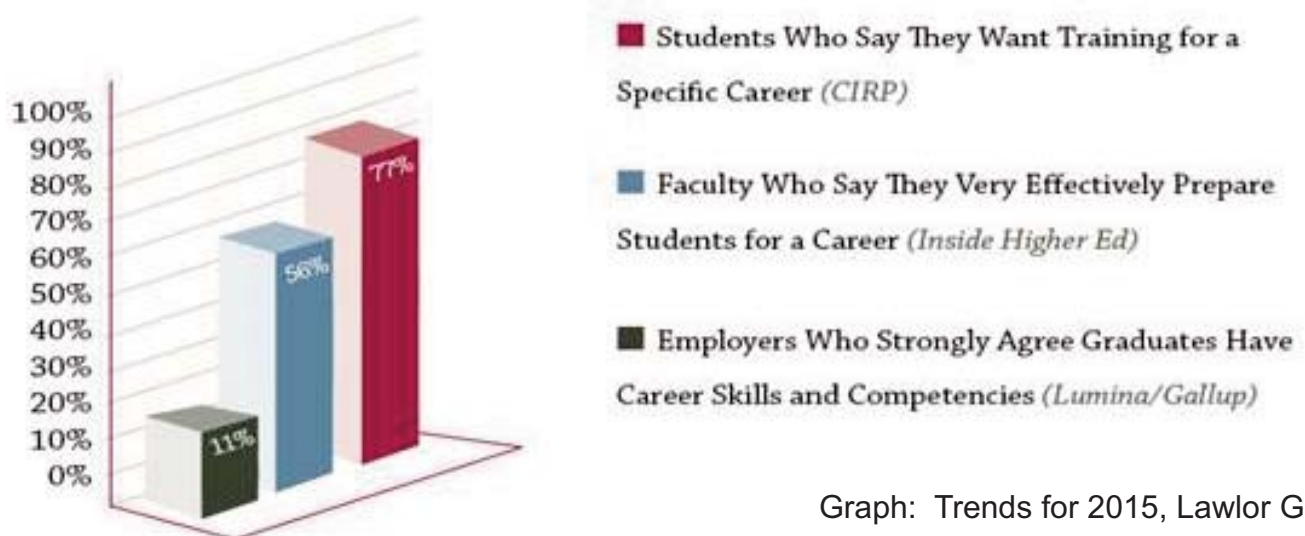
