



Education Town Hall Forum






Take Advantage: Tuition Waivers


HR Process Review

Legislative Corner

Increasing Detroit's Pipeline to Higher Education

Edgar Vann participated in a panel discussion on "Increasing Detroit's Pipeline to Higher Education." Michigan State Representative Sherry Gay-Dagnogo assembled panelists from across the state with diverse backgrounds in education, mentorship and community involvement to discuss critical

issues stagnating our K-12 students from

obtaining a higher education.









This week the Department of Talent and Economic Development was launched with the aim of making Michigan a national leader in

talent development for skilled trades such as manufacturing, welding, electrical work and automotive production. Govenor Rick Snyder issued an executive order in December creating the department to house the state's economic growth and job training efforts. That order also created the Michigan Talent Investment Agency within the new department which will coordinate job preparedness and worker training programs.

Budget Hearings Continue: The House Appropriations Subcommittee on Community Colleges took more testimony last week on topics of interest to community colleges. In particular, the subcommittee heard from Dr. Tom Quinn of Kirtland Community College, who presented on the problem that nontaxable land poses for some community colleges. The subcommittee also heard from Representative Amanda Price, who explained her House Bill 4265, which would allow noncontiguous annexation to a community college district.

Federal Budget: House and Senate proposals call for significant cuts to federal student aid. In particular, the House budget calls for \$150 billion in cuts through the elimination of several student aid benefits. Both proposals would eliminate \$89 billion in mandatory funds from the Pell Grant program.
