


# **Employee Travel Expense Reimbursement Process**














# **Division of Student Services**






# **Who Attends Community College?**



# House Considers State Reciprocity Agreement

For the last several months, the MCCA has been working with the public and private universities, the Midwest Higher Education Compact (MHEC) and the State Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs on legislation to authorize Michigan's participation in reciprocity agreements for distance education with other states. That legislation, Senate Bill 221, came up for testimony this week in the House Education Committee. The Committee did not take any action on SB 221, but is likely to do so next week.

### House Panel Votes to End MEGA Credits

The House Tax Policy Committee took further testimony and voted out House Bills 4333 and 4334. Together, the bills would prohibit the Michigan Economic Growth Authority (MEGA) from entering into any new agreements for MEGA credits, and would also prohibit the Authority from modifying an existing agreement in a way that would reduce a company's tax liability. The bills now go to the full House of Representatives.






