


Student Pathways to Degree Completion




Survey Research: Student Goals and Plans

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness supports the District through survey research to better understand student needs and goals. Each Fall semester, new freshman receive the New Entering Student Survey to gather information that support planning and services that help students navigate their college experiences and plans.


A study entitled "Navigating a Sea of Choices," found that a huge variety of program offerings can work — if the students know what their goals are. The study suggest:

Simplifying program offerings so students are given less complex choices. Teach students how to self-advise so that they know which programs they need to reach their career of choice. Give students the right data in an easy online format, reveal the jobs that are doing well in their region, and demonstrate how the schools program can prepare them for those jobs.



With **72.4%** of new WCCCD freshman reporting their goals to "get a job" with their education, the majority of students in career programs rate career planning and job success information "excellent to good."


Division of Administration and Finance














District Police Authority

Community College Baccalaureate

The Senate Commerce Committee took brief testimony on Sentate Bill 98 on May 20, but did not vote that day. The Committee Chair, Wayne Schmidt announced his intention to return for more testimony on the issue and MCCA representatives are working to ascertain a date for that hearing.



Local Government Prohibition

Last week, the House of Representatives approved House Bill 4052 which would prohibit a wide variety of local policies and ordinances related to wages and benefits for public employers, including community colleges.




Take Advantage of Two Great Benefits Programs!

Tuition Assistance


Wayne County Community College District Fall 2015 Requisition Process – Draft

WCCCD's Study Abroad Program Changes Lives - Builds Leadership Skills



"Studying abroad enhanced my plans for the "Studying abroad enhanced my plans for the future because it opened my eyes to the rest of the world. For the week we were in Geneva, Switzerland and interacting with different people, eating new foods — all of that made me realize I wanted to travel the world and to experience newness for the rest of my life. I plan to be a global citizen just like students at Webster University," said Victoria Bankowski, who is in the TRIO Program at Wayne County Community College District (WCCCD).





Bankowski, who is also a member of the National Honor Society, was one of 26 WCCCD students who spent a week at Webster University as part of the WCCCD's Spring 2015 Study Abroad Program. Webster is proud of the 670 students who represent 90 countries making up its community of learners. The university is celebrating its 100th-year with banners that read: Embracing Differences – Global Cittzenship. The WCCCD students were engaged by Webster faculty representing 25 nations.

Carolyn Hall is thankful for her eye-opening experience in Switzerland. "This has helped to make me an international citizen," referencing to the banners that decked the halls at Webster University.

"I raised my eyebrows when the lecturer mentioned that Swiss women were given the right to vote on the federal level in 1971. Bankowski, who is also a member of the



For more than a decade now, Wayne County Community College District has advanced its mission statement to expose students to culturally diverse experiences and globally competitive higher education and career advancement. This philosophy, as manifested in the District's Study Abroad Program, also changes the future outdook of its students and the way they view the world. Since the inception, the program, more than 1,000 WCCCD students have traveled to more than 16 countries to study the languages; diverse cultures; and experience life beyond the traditional classroom.

At Webset University the students studied the uniqueness of Switzerland and interacted with students from around the world; toured the campus and shared meals with Webster University students.

The Downtown Campus is in full swing as the summer 2015 semester started. Staff members have been busy assisting students in locating classes and helping them find other student services needs.








Blackboard Discussion


