






River Rouge High School Open House





The Fiscal Accountability Operation Center (FAOC) focuses on meeting and achieving the goals of processing WCCCD vendor payments in an accurate and timely manner. We continuously review accounts payable best practice guidelines and enhance policy procedures:

- * Payments are made from original invoices
- * A W-9 must be on file for all vendors
- * Policy communicating standards for invoice numbers entered into the system
- * A segregation of duties to allow separate process from the person approving the invoice and the person signing the check
- Have all invoices come to FAOC prior to being sent out for approval(s)
- A new vendor welcome letter is sent informing them of the FAOC mailing address whereby invoices should be sent
- * Watch payables carefully to take advantage of any discounts being offered by the vendors




Best Practices Workshop



WCCCD Student Survey of Instruction (SSOI)



VoIP Update

The first full VoIP functionality will be rolled out to the District Call Center and the Financial Aid Call Center. The District is implementing VistaPoint VoIP software for the main call center and Cisco Call Center Express for financial aid. This software will improve the quality and efficiency of the call centers by providing advanced call handling and queue management tools.



Workforce Development Building Apprenticeship Opportunities



Communication Matrix Taskforce





