
Dual Enrollment Program Harper Woods High School







National research indicates that completion rates are higher for non-traditional students. Therefore, the measures that rely on traditional first-time full-time students fail to capture the full range of outcomes among today's college students. IE uses data analysis to monitor and track degrees conferred and monitor completion pathways of students. The table above represents WCCCD awards conferred by award type and age group.

The Divisioin of Information Technology (IT) is conducting a comprehensive IT security assessment with the assistance of Plante Moran to ensure all our critical security controls, technology, policies and procedures are keeping up with the ever changing IT security landscape.

Joint Higher Education Subcommittees to Review Tuition

The Senate and House Appropriations Subcommittees on Higher Education announced this week that they will hold a joint meeting on September 24, 2015. The subcommittees will hear testimony from Oakland University and Eastern Michigan University, both of whom chose to forego incentive funding from the state this year in favor of raising tuition levels by more than the rate encouraged by the Legislature.

White House Unveils College Scorecard

The White House unveiled the new College Scorecard website featuring some new information about colleges not previously available on the predecessor site or from other federal data sources. The website notably does not rate/rank colleges, but for each college, it includes measurements of students' earnings six and 10 years after they started at a college and data showing the proportion of the college's students who are repaying their student loans.




