


Paving the Way to a Brighter Detroit



ITTP PROJECT UPDATE DATA CLOSET RE-ENGINEERING PROJECT

The data closet re-engineering project moves unsecured data and networking equipment, located in classrooms, to standards based, secure data closets that are accessible from hallway corridors. Existing data closets were modified to meet these standards and new closets will be built to these standards. All unsecure networking equipment will be moved to the new, standards based data closets. The Downtown campus standard was used as a model to replicate the data closet restructuring across the District.

District-wide access to enterprise applications is dependent on the networking equipment in the data closets. District Police Authority depends on this networking equipment for both audio communications and camera surveillance; both the radio network and the camera system run across the network. The critical nature of this equipment makes physical security and access control a top priority.

Pell Grant National News

Pell Grant Surplus: The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) released cost estimates and projections for the Pell Grant program. The revised estimates show a significant surplus for the next several fiscal years. For fiscal year (FY) 2017 the Pell Grant program will have a surplus of \$8.7 billion. A surplus will remain in place until FY 2025. This represents a significant shift over last year's estimates which predicted a shortfall as early as FY 2018.

Potential Impact on Community Colleges: The budget resolution calls for the elimination of mandatory Pell Grant funding, and freezing the Pell Grant maximum at the current level (\$5,815) for the next decade. It would also eliminate Pell Grants for less-than-half-time students, eliminate the administration fee paid to intuitions to administer grant aid, and set an income cap for Pell Grant recipients. The budget resolution also proposes rolling back changes to the Pell Grant needs analysis formula passed under the College Cost Reduction and Access Act of 2007.

Request for Advocacy: Given the scale of the surplus, the national associations are concerned that Congressional appropriators may identify the Pell Grant program as a source of funds to be diverted to other priorities. Please contact your members of Congress to urge them to protect the Pell Grant programand utilize thesurplus to facilitate the reinstatement of year-round Pell Grants.

Center for Student Success Update

NSC Proposal to Streamline VA Certifying Process Announced: The National Student Clearinghouse announced a proposal at the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers' 2016 Annual Meeting that would cut down on manual processes involved in the School Certifying Official's role with processing VA benefits. These changes would also make real-time information more readily available for advising student veterans on benefit use.

Achieve the Dream

Achieving the Dream Open Educational Resources (OER) Degree Initiative Application: This OER initiative aims to involve faculty in using open educational resources to redesign courses and degree programs. The Community College Consortium for Open Educational Resources (CCCOER) is a partner with Achieving the Dream on this Initiative. Between 20 and 30 community colleges will be selected to participate in a three-year effort to implement OER Degree programs. Deadline is April 8.
