





National Student Nurse Association Seminar


Nursing students had the experience of a lifetime by attending the National Student Nurses' Association (NSNA) 64th Annual Convention.

Police Authority Training




Members of the District Police Authority participated in an incident report writing training session conducted by Lieutenant Alexis Townsend.





Where Do Welders Work?








WCCCD Welding Student Demographics

WCCCD's Procurement Department


The success of WCCCD's Procurement Department is based on communication of district procedures and interaction between divisional leaders. Current audits and reviews in process by the Office of Accountability and Transparency include:

- 1. Policy and review of finance and administration procedural manuals
- 2. Internal audit reviews and process controls conducted to maintain compliance of procuring the District's supplies
- 3. Assessing communication reports to assist leadership, vendors and stakeholders involved in the procurement process
- 4. Reviews current policies with the Office of Accountability and Transparency (CQI) to ensure timely ordering of inventory and delivery of supplies across the District
- 5. Continuously review of best practices related to procurement, compliance and management

Ways of Improving Procurement Planning

- Campus Outreach –Continually listening to departments needs and understanding time restraints
- Staff and department heads meet monthly to discuss continued opportunities
- On a weekly basis, contracts and new policies are reviewed and discussed to make decisions
- Annual Surveys are sent out to all stakeholders








District-wide Professional Closet Clothing Drive
