





Division of Educational Affairs



Textbook Selection Process

What's Trending? The New Normal

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness conducts research and identifies trends to better understand how the District compares to what's trending nationally. According to a report entitled "Learning While Earning: The New Normal," over the last 25 years, more than 70% of college students have been working while enrolled. These 14 million college students face the challenge of balancing work, school, and Effective other life priorities. The report explores these working learners and finds that students can't work their way through college anymore to offset debt.



One-third of working learners are

30 or older



Out of the 14 million working learners, 19% have children



25% of all working learners are simultaneously employed full-time and enrolled in college full-time



About 40% of undergraduate students work at least 30 hours a week



Software Asset Management

They have conducted a review of our infrastructure and are now developing best practices around key IT security domains. The project scope includes creating a comprehensive

security policy that addresses all infrastructure assets; hardware, operating systems and software. Our goal is to implement a state-of-the-art security infrastructure, engineered to proactively protect our technology assets and prevent unauthorized access to our information and systems.

The WCCCD Trade Adjustment Assistance Community College and Career Training Cyber Security Advisory Committee held its quarterly meeting to discuss program updates. 


Grosse Pointe Board of Realtors



This week the topic of discussion during Intercultureal Conversations was "Can Courses on Diversity Make a Real Difference?" They also talked about how the evidence shows that such courses can also improve student's civic engagement.



Traditional Remediation and its Effectiveness

In a report on student success (Community College Daily, 2016) traditional remediation, incoming students taking non-credit developmental education courses before enrolling in regular college courses, the practice has been unsuccessful for students to complete. According to the study, 20% of remedial students in community colleges complete the gateway courses within two years with only 17% on to graduate.

Percent of students enrolled in remediation who complete the associated introductory (gateway) course in two years.
