





It is extremely important for new students to select a refund preference as soon as they receive their Higher One card to prevent delays in receiving their refund.



Chip Technology



Have you received in the mail a new credit/debit card from your bank with the new enhanced chip technology? If not, you will be soon. A "chip card" features an embedded microchip which provides dynamic transaction security features and other capabilities not possible with the traditional magnetic stripe cards, making it extremely difficult to counterfeit, ultimately protecting you and your finances.

Chip technology is used widely around the world, this will provide greater card acceptance when traveling internationally. Stay tuned for frequently asked questions about the chip technology next week.





Early Childhood Care and Education: **Needs of Our Service Area**

According to a study commissioned by the Community Foundation of Southeast Michigan, one-third of children in the tri-county area lack access to early childhood care. Additionally, there is an increased demand to train and educate both parents and practitioners to meet the need. The top areas of need for early childhood education and care are in the District's immediate Wayne County service area. In addition to curriculum reviews by our faculty, the District has maintained focus meetings with community agencies and foundations to partner and address early childhood care and education.




Homeland Security Training



Reaching Adults with Some College, No Degree

In Michigan, 25% of the working adult population (25-64) have earned some college credit, but no degree. This is the highest in the nation and represents approximately \$1.3 million people in Michigan. The Reaching For Opportunity: An Action Plan to Increase Michigan's Postsecondary Credential Attainment report explores other aspects of educational attainment, college completion, and student success.

Tax Credit Reconsidered

The Senate Finance Committee reported out Senate Bill 461, which would reinstate the Michigan income tax credit for donations to Michigan colleges and universities and their foundations. The credit was eliminated in 2011 as part of sweeping tax changes that also repealed the Michigan Business Tax and a number of individual income tax credits. The Department of Treasury opposes SB 461, which now goes to the full Senate.
