

Tax season is underway!

The Payroll Department has been very busy issuing W-2's which are scheduled to be mailed out on January 28, 2016. Taxpayers have until April 18 to file their 2015 tax returns and pay any tax due because of the Emancipation Day holiday in Washington, D.C., falling on April 15, 2016.

Frequently Asked W-2 Questions

What earnings are included on my W-2?

W-2s for the 2015 tax year include all employee wages paid between January 1- December 31, 2015. Wages earned after December 25, 2015 will be paid in January 2016 and are not included on the 2015 W-2.

Why is my taxable income (Box 1) different from my year-to-date on my check stub?

Box 1 reflects your taxable gross. Taxable gross is your gross minus any tax-deferred deductions, which can include:

- 403(b)—voluntary contributions to a deferred investment program
- Employee pre-tax paid health contributions
- Flexible Spending Accounts (dependent care or medical)
- AFLAC
- Michigan Public State Education Retirement System withholdings
- Optional life insurance withholdings

- Registration begins




WCCCD and National Research Trends



Level of education for Michigan residents ages 25-64







Campus Data Closet Re-engineering Project



The Downtown College is the pilot site of the Data Closet Re-engineering Project. This project moves unsecured data and networking equipment, located in classrooms, to standards based, secure data closets that are accessible from hallway corridors. The first phase was wiring which is now 70% complete, and we have begun the construction phase, which will build out six new data closets.

Once the construction is completed, all network equipment will be deployed to the new data closets. The Downtown College pilot will be used as a model to standardize the other District colleges. The new data closets were designed using best practices and utilizes standards for critical elements:

> *Wiring *Cooling *Equipment Racks *Air conditioning

*Electrical *Power *Security and access control

Arial Software: Campaign Enterprise

Community residents, who are interested in working the polls for upcoming elections, are attending poll worker training courses at the Northwest College.


WCCCD Graduate Receives Scholarship


Best Bank Representatives Visit College








Legislative Corner Did You Know?

In 2013-14, Michigan community colleges awarded 37,246 certificates and degrees, almost twice as many degrees as awards in 2000-01 (19,637). And in each year between 2000-01 and 2012-13, Michigan community colleges set records by awarding more degrees and certificates than the previous year.





Pell Grants for Dual Enrollment- Experimental Sites Initiative



Application Deadline February 1, 2016 **SUMMARY:** The Secretary invites postsecondary institutions that participate in the student financial assistance programs authorized under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (HEA), as amended, to apply to participate in a new institution-based experiment under the Experimental Sites Initiative (ESI). Under the ESI, the Secretary has authority to grant waivers from certain Title IV, HEA statutory or regulatory requirements to allow a limited number of institutions to participate in experiments to test alternative methods for administering the title IV, HEA programs.

ESI experiments are designed to facilitate efforts by institutions to explore particular innovative practices aimed at improving student outcomes, the delivery of services, or both. Under this experiment, participating institutions will be provided a waiver of the specific statutory and regulatory provisions that prevent students who are enrolled in secondary school from receiving Federal Pell Grants for enrollment in title IV-eligible postsecondary programs.
