Distance Learning



- Superior wideband voice and microphone quality
 - One-way audio calls until the called party presses the intercom button
 - Two-way audio stream
 - "Audio whisper" mode that allows intercom use when the party is live without disturbing existing call

Professional Development Travel Expense Reports for FY 2015-16

As the Finance Department prepares to close out the 2015-16 fiscal year, the Purchasing Department has begun contacting previous travelers with outstanding expense reports. Even if no reimbursement is requested, travelers are still required to complete and submit a Professional Development Expense Report and a Professional Development Summary Report. All forms are available on the website.

All requests for reimbursement, i.e. travel expense, miscellaneous expense, or eligible tuition reimbursement applications for the current fiscal year should be submitted to Finance by June 30, 2016, and include the following:

- Appropriate supervisory signatures
- Back-up documentation and original receipts where required
- Conference Summary Report
- Professional development expense reports are to be submitted for processing within 10 working days after the conference or workshop.

The business mileage rate for 2015 was 57.5 cents per mile.


The current business mileage rate as of January 1, 2016, is 54 cents per mile.








According to Community College Week, members of the Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Honor Society have success rates far in excess of national averages. Research indicates that the six- year completion rate for PTK members is 85% and another 7% still enrolled and working toward a degree, making the overall completion rate 92%.




