


Community Police Outreach


What's Trending at WCCCD: Transfer and Mobility



According to a study by the National Student Clearing House Center, community colleges play a significant role in students' pathways. Although students may not earn an associate's degree, nearly a quarter of the students who started at a community college transferred to a four-year institution. The Division of Institutional Effectiveness is in the process of conducting follow-up research on WCCCD students who were enrolled in Career and Technical Education programs and subsequently left the institution without obtaining a credential. 31% transferred to another institution after leaving WCCCD.

- ✓ Of the 31% who transferred after leaving WCCCD, 53% transferred to a four-year institution.
- ✓ 21% of those who transferred to a four-year institution enrolled at an institution out-of-state.

2 year public institutions had a transfer rate of 39.5%



The project is expected to be completed by the end of next week.



An Affordable Beacon of Hope for the Greater Wayne County Region



Com., WCCCD is 15% less expensive than the national average public two-year tuition of \$3,263. The District has consistently maintained affordable access while neighboring community colleges have opted to increase tuition. Truly, WCCCD is an affordable option "where learning leads to a better life." Compared to similar institutions in the region, WCCCD is the most affordable option.





Legislative Corner

Bills to Watch...Senate Bill 98



The bill would amend the Community College Act to do the following:

- Allow a community college district board of trustees to establish education programs and grant baccalaureate degrees in ski area management, wastewater treatment technology, allied health, information technology, or manufacturing technology.
- Allow a board to establish a nursing education program that granted bachelor of science in nursing (BSN) degrees.
- Specify the requirements for the establishment and operation of a community college BSN degree program.

May Revenues Improve

Revenue to the State's General Fund and School Aid Fund totaled \$1.7 billion in May 2016, the Senate Fiscal Agency said in a report released this week, a 9.5% increase from 2015. That's due to above-forecast sales tax revenue and individual income tax withholding collections, which more than offset greater-than-expected refunds under the individual income tax as well.

National Empowerment for the Humanites Grant Opportunity

Humanities Connections grants seek to expand the role of the humanities in the undergraduate curriculum at two- and four-year institutions, offering students in all academic fields new opportunities to develop the intellectual skills and habits of mind that the humanities cultivate.






