


# Continuous Quality Improvement Audit Team







# Halloween Family Fun Fest



# Higher Learning Commission Gives APPROVAL Perfect 10

After three days of in-depth, on campus evaluation and review in March, members of the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) recommended WCCCD for another 10 year accreditation without any recommendations, the highest possible length of accreditation for any postsecondary educational institution.

The HLC accredits degree-granting post-secondary educational institutions in the North Central region. It is an independent corporation and one of two commission members of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA), which is one of six regional institutional accreditors in the United States.

The HLC maintains a Peer Review Corps of approximately 1,300 faculty and administrators from institutions within the nineteen state North Central region. The peer reviewers play an incredibly important role in all stages of the process. They are responsible for assuring that an institution is complying with the criteria as well as for helping an institution advance within the context of its own mission.



WCCCD faculty, staff, and members of the Board of Trustees were attentive while HLC Peer Review Chair, Dr. Phyllis Abt presented the team report. She praised the exemplary efforts WCCCD put forward in the District's self-study report and preparations for the visit. According to Abt, "The team examined the

According to Abt, "The team examined the work of the District related to its mission, strategic planning, budget development and cost-containment, student outcomes, community engagement, and capacity to continue serving the constituents well. We were impressed by the efforts of the District and its Chancellor and recommended that the next comprehensive visit by HLC occurs in 2019-2020."

In a few weeks, WCCCD will receive a draft copy of the team's report to review for factual accuracy. A final accreditation report will then be issued to the HLC.
