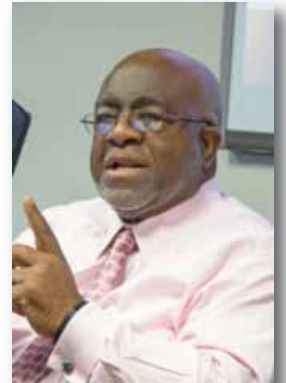

'The Future of Integration' conference held at WCCCD's Downtown Campus

Approximately 70 educational, legal, social and policy leaders, scholars and other stakeholders convened earlier this month on WCCCD's Downtown Campus to participate in a conference on integration. Organized by WCCCD's Institute for Social Progress, under the banner, "The Future of Integration," the conference fielded a panel of experts dedicated to promoting integration as it relates to education, housing, communities and urban development, while addressing these tenets in innovative and contemporary ways.

The panel, invited by WCCCD Chancellor Dr. Curtis L. Ivery, consisted of Rob Brynmaier, executive director, Oak Park Regional Housing Center; Godfrey Dillard, civil rights attorney; Michael Hilton, policy analyst, Poverty and Race Research Action Council; Tanya Clay-House, deputy assistant secretary for P-12 education, U. S. Department of Education; Marla Krysan, professor, department of sociology, and Institute of Government and Public Affairs, University of Illinois at Chicago; Natalie Y. Moore, author and reporter, Chicago's WBEZ-NPR; Lee Teitel, faculty director, Reimagining Integration Diverse and Equitable Schools, Harvard University; and Joshua Bassett, moderator and senior fellow, WCCCD's Institute for Social Progress.

Moore, who recently authored the book, "The South Side: A Portrait of Chicago and American Segregation," admitted, while her publication describes segregation in Chicago, the book's content also mirrors segregation in other major northern cities, including Detroit.

"I wrote this book because I felt that segrega-

tion is not being talked about a lot," said Moore, who once worked as a reporter for a Detroit newspaper. "I went into writing the book being pessimistic. I came out more optimistic, because there are real policies and solutions out there to solve the many problems of segregation in cities such as Chicago and Detroit, but solving such problems starts with getting people to stop saying, 'It's not my job.'"

How to best integrate public schools has been a major topic for a long time in America, and gained momentum, to a great degree, after the landmark case *Brown v. Board of Education* in 1954, when the Supreme Court declared state laws that established separate public schools for black and white students were unconstitutional.

"In 1974, Justice Thurgood Marshall wrote, 'Unless our children begin to learn together, then there is little hope that our people will ever learn to live together,'" said Lee Teitel, faculty director for Harvard University's Reimagining Integration: Diverse and Equitable Schools (RIDES) program. "This

project aspires to find innovative ways to help increase the number and quality of the settings where children can learn together, and people can learn to live together."

Teitel described how RIDES holds numerous formal and informal discussions/events pertaining to integration and desegregation, in settings which include local/national educators, parents, members of communities, policymakers, researchers and other stakeholders, all of which are interested in reimagining integration in innovative and creative ways.

"This whole issue of integration has been a major part of my experience as long as I can remember," said Ivery. "Even after the landmark case *Brown v. Board of Education* more than 60 years ago, we are still struggling with integration. Schools are more segregated here in the Midwest than they are in the South."

WCCCD's Institute for Social Progress is dedicated to elevating educational equality and civic participation amongst the diverse communities of metro Detroit and the nation at large. To

do this, the organization engages and networks with other institutions, including the nation's premier universities and top legal and academic minds. These collaborations present perfect opportunities to think about and discuss issues of equal access to higher education, social mobility, segregation, race and ethnicity in ways that expand the opportunity for understanding and educational advancement for all.

"As a community college, it's one of our responsibilities to provide these types of forums, and it could never be more important than now," said Ivery, who has served as WCCCD's chancellor since 1995. "I hope that this forum will empower the thoughts of leadership to know where the resources are, and how to employ such resources

to embrace integration. I hope that this conference causes us to consider the future of education, and the future of empowering our young people."

Ivery reflected on the future of integration in Detroit's public schools. He believes as more diverse populations move into the city, there will be a seismic shift in how public schools will ultimately look.

"We are becoming a more global community," Ivery said. "As far as integration, inevitably, we will get there. It may be slow, but I think ultimately, here in Detroit, we will appreciate the importance of integration and being a global community in the context of interacting with people from all walks of life."

Conference attendee Brian H. White, chief of staff for Detroit Council-

woman Mary Sheffield and a longtime civil rights advocate, added. "In general, we've made strides and progress, but we still have far to go in terms of social justice, integration and economic equality."

"But, anytime there are conversations and forums like this one, which addresses ways we can improve in these areas, I'm all in. And, as far as integration in Detroit Public Schools is concerned, I see so many other layers of issues that must be addressed first."

"We have to bring down crime in the city that sometimes overlaps into our schools, because certain populations will refuse to integrate into our public schools in great numbers unless crime and academic performances are effectively addressed."

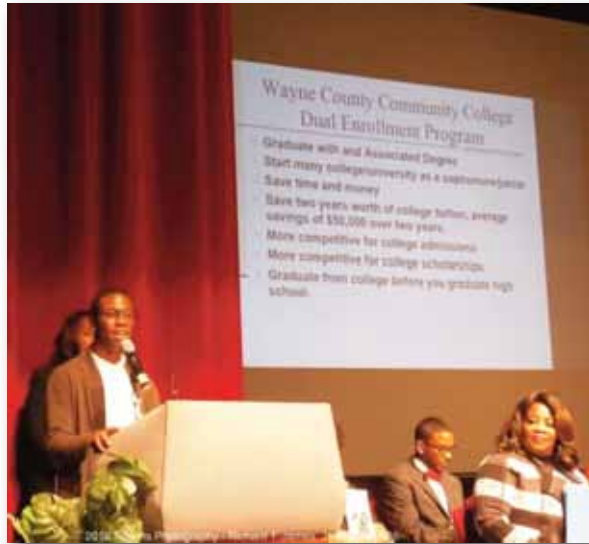

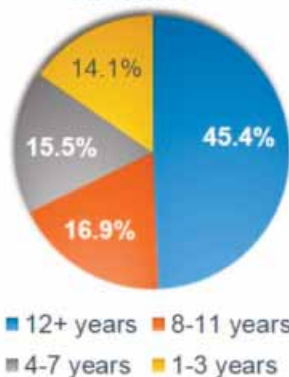

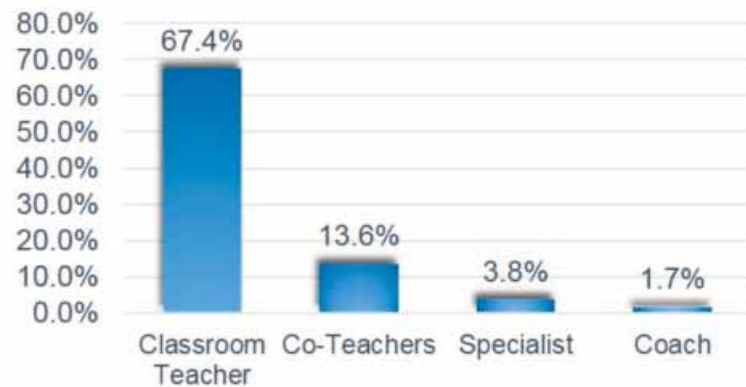
Early Childhood Education

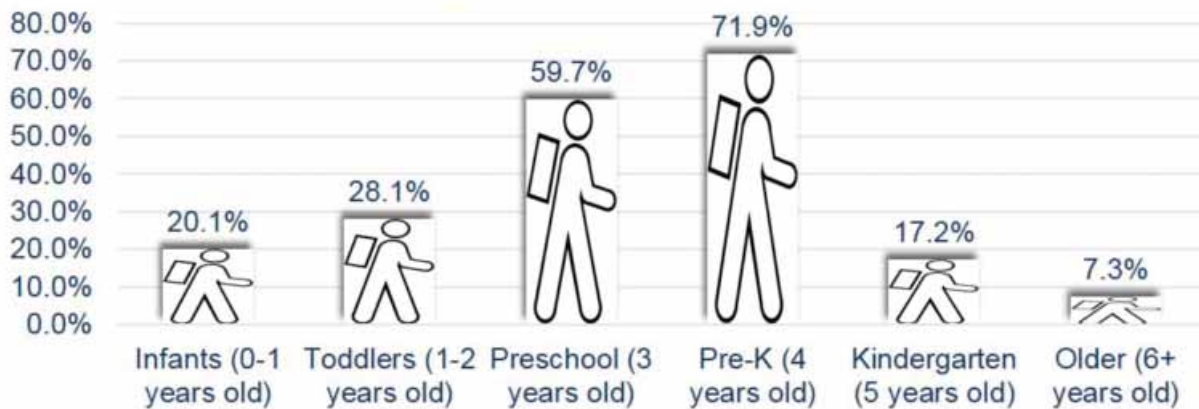
Years worked as an educator



Type of positions held

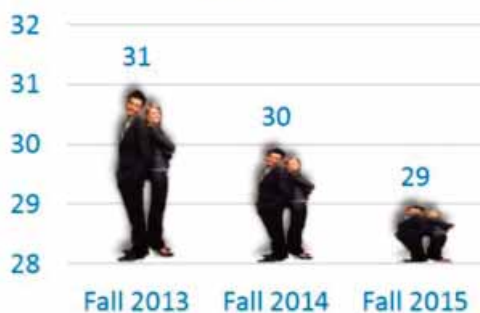


Ages of children served

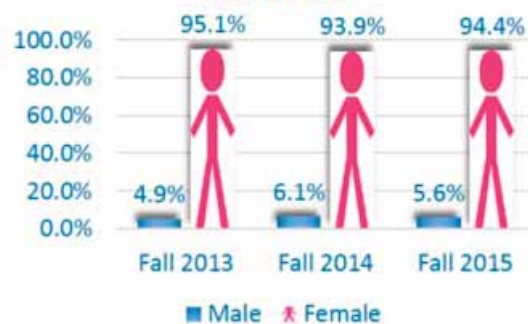
