










Genealogy Students Making Discoveries



Health Sciences

Simulation Laboratory

The NUR114 obstetric nursing students participated in a scenario that mimicked a real post-partum hemorrhage crisis that occurs in the labor and delivery room of a hospital setting.







This week the Health Science Interdisciplinary Simulation Laboratory (HSISL) received their two C.O.W.'s (Computers on Wheels). These systems have the capability for the students to scan the barcodes on the patients and medicine to increase their simulation and clinical practices.

Nursing students in NUR 114 obstetric nursing were also practicing setting up an Alaris Fusion System pump. They programmed it with the correct flow and amount.



Dentrix Training Continuation

Dental hygiene students started their Dentrix Training. A representative from Dentrix visited the dental clinic to assist students. Students were able to do restorative charting and periodontal charting with the assistance of this dental software. Dentrix is used in many dental offices.

HESI Prep Course

The Health Science Center hosted the Health Education System, Inc. (HESI) prep course. This course was designed to assist students in preparing an application for the Nursing Program.



Information Technology Institute

Plan of Work Boot Camps







The Information Technology Institute conducted Plan of Work Boot Camps for CIS/IT students to help them manage completion of their programs. Staff guided students through Degree Works, which is WCCCD's Graduation Progress System (GPS) that tracks program completion. State Approved EMS Continuing Education


