

What's Trending in IE: Non-Traditional Female STEM Completions

According to the National Science Foundation, women remain underrepresented in the science and engineering workforce, although to a lesser degree than in the past. Women represent 29% of the science and engineering workforce. In 2016, WCCCD experienced an increase in the percent of female students obtaining awards in computer information system, engineering, and mechanics and repair technologies.

WCCCD female students earning awards in the selected STEM fields.


