Students from across the community participated in sessions focused on studying about germs and live bacteria in the Inspire STEM Research Laboratory.














Design Center


Office of Accountability and Transparency

- Students must notify Designated School Official if they change their address, phone number or dependency status within 10 days.







Division of Institutional Effectiveness

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness routinely reviews regional research to gather external environmental data that may impact the District's planning. According to a recent publication by Southeast Michigan Council of Government (SEMCOG), the population trends in Southeast Michigan indicate a projected decline in the population aged 25 to 64. This decline will put a strain on the supply of labor and the suggested solution is to focus on investments in a more highly skilled and educated work force. Below you will find sample data from the SEMCOG report.

Business 150 International Food Expo




