



Dual enrollment students from the Lincoln Park and Taylor School districts participated in WCCCD's Phi Theta Kappa Inducation Ceremony.








The Outreach team was on hand at Detroit School of Arts (DSA) as Dr. Penson discussed the dual enrollment courses available this academic year with students.



Faculty Blackboard Training




Division of Institutional Effectiveness

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness supports the District by coordinating participation in national survey research for benchmarking purposes. WCCCD participates with the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE) to understand student engagement patterns and trends to inform student experiences. Below is a summary of key facts related to CCSSE and its benchmarks that inform student success.

Approximately **307** community colleges participate nationwide with **26** from Michigan to include WCCCD.

According to CCSSE research, Active and Collaborative Learning benchmark was one of the most important factors associated to "pervasive" student success.

The League of Women Voters, a national organization was on campus presenting information on the recent auto insurance proposals and how they will impact Detroiters.


























