

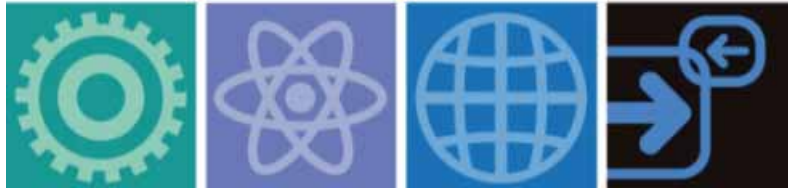
To "Camp Infinity" and Beyond!

ABOUT THE PROGRAM
The Nursing program at WCCCD offers an Associate of Applied Science degree in Nursing. Graduates of the Nursing program are eligible to take the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN). Program requirements include specific courses in the nursing major and general education. The Nursing program is designed to prepare graduates to provide nursing care as staff nurses in a variety of health care settings.

WHAT DO REGISTERED NURSES (RN) DO?
Registered nurses (RNs) provide and coordinate patient care, educate patients and the public about various health conditions, and provide advice and emotional support to patients and their family members.



Pre-Mortuary Science

ABOUT THE PROGRAM
Pre-mortuary Science Associate of Science degree program prepares students for entrance into a mortuary science program and an eventual career as a mortician. This program is designed in accordance with the Mortuary Science program at Wayne State University, which is the only institution in Michigan that prepares students for State certification in mortuary science. Because entrance into the WSU program is competitive, a minimum requirement for application is completion of at least 60 credit hours with a grade of "C" or better as outlined in the WSU graduate bulletin.

WHAT DO MORTUARY SCIENCE WORKERS DO?
Funeral directors perform various tasks to arrange and direct funeral services, such as coordinating transportation of body to mortuary, interviewing family or other authorized person to arrange details, selecting caskets, acting with the selection of officiants for religious rites, and providing transportation for inquests. Morticians and embalmers oversee the preparation and care of the remains of people who have died, and perform embalming duties as necessary.

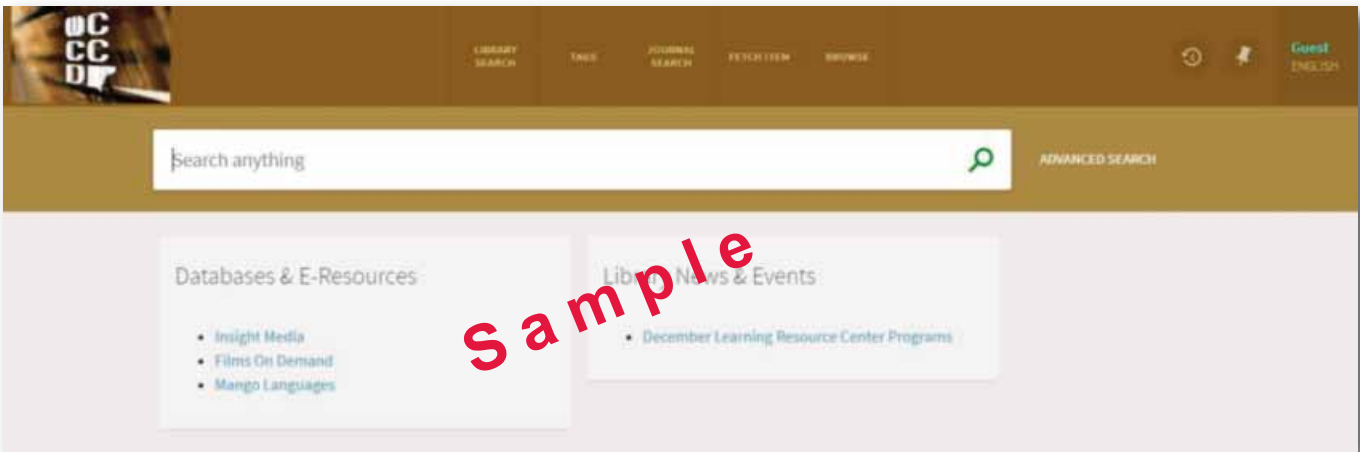
Oneka Samet facilitated a workshop entitled “Cyber Safety” with our local library partners at the Conley Branch Library.

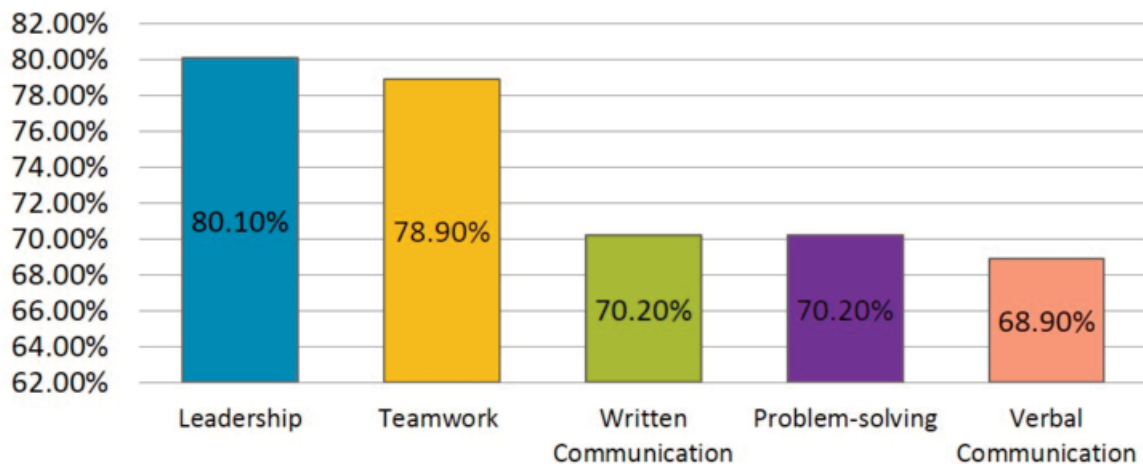

What are Employers Looking For?

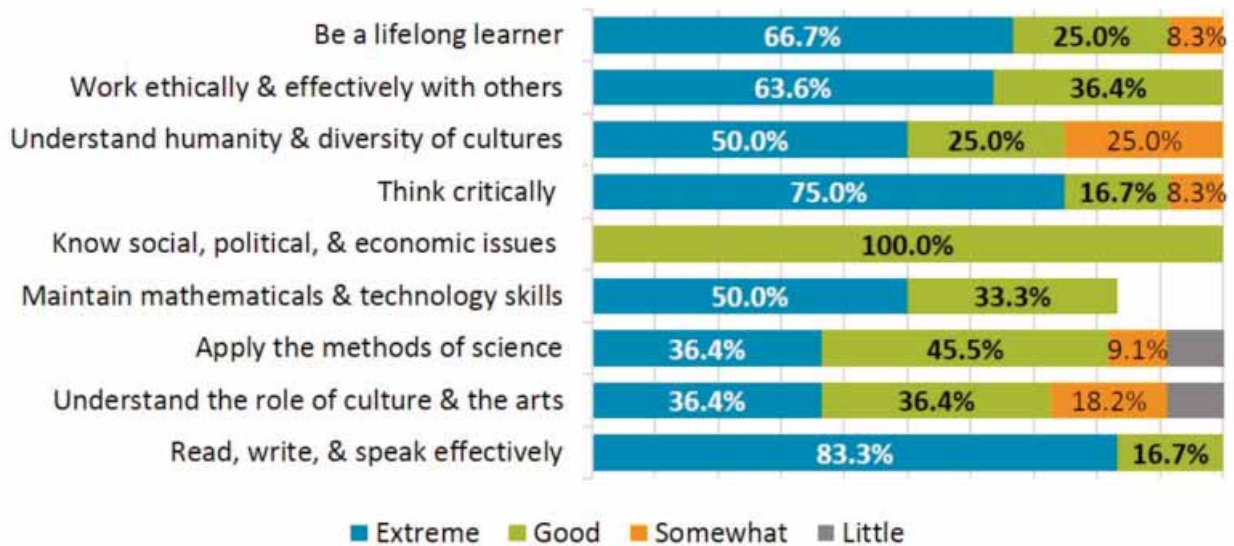

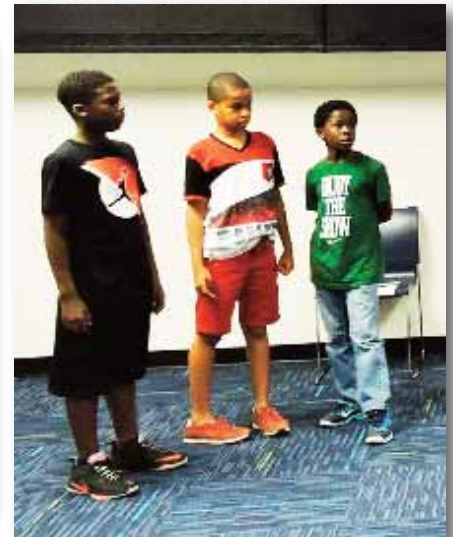
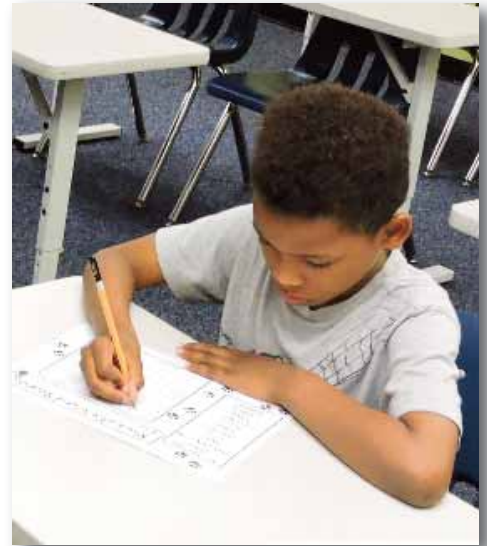
Myron Curenton's Intro to the Visual Arts class experienced the Riverwalk Conservancy photographing various aspects as they walked and toured the conservancy.

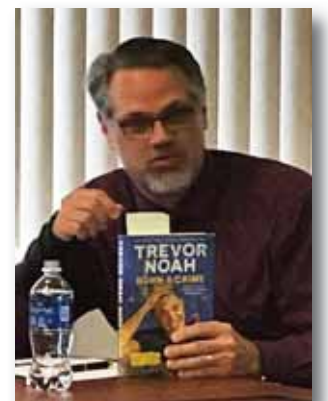

Legislative Corner



Educational Access Instruction Act

Governor Snyder signed Senate Bill 249, which would prohibit educational institutions – including community colleges – from placing deed restrictions on property such that another school could not use the property, and would prohibit a local government from enforcing zoning limitations that would have the same effect.

MPERS Changes Become Law

Governor Snyder signed into law Senate Bill 401, which will place new public school employees into a defined contribution (DC) retirement plan as the default, with an option to select a hybrid DC plan if they chose to do so.

State Authorization Reciprocity Extended

Governor Snyder also signed Senate Bill 260, which extends the sunset date of the Higher Education Authorization and Distance Education Reciprocal Exchange Act by six years.

House Subcommittee Marks Up Education, Labor Funding Bill

The House Labor, HHS and Education appropriations subcommittee have released its FY 2018 appropriations bill. Overall, the draft bill includes \$156 billion in discretionary funding, \$5 billion below last year's level. With so much less funding to work with, there are numerous cuts to community college priority programs.

June Tax Collections Up Significantly

The Department of Treasury raked in \$169.6 million more than the Senate Fiscal Agency estimated for June, in large part due to lower-than-expected Michigan Business Tax refunds.

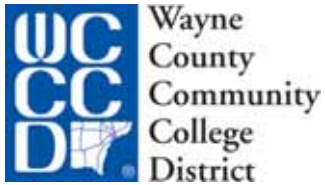
Department of Education

The bill cuts overall funding for the U.S. Department of Education (ED) by \$2.4 billion, about 3.5% from last year's level. The cut grows to \$4 billion when a rescission from the Pell Grant surplus is taken into account (see below). Funding for many ED programs is not yet available because specific appropriations levels are not generally released until the full appropriations committee markup.

Pell Grant Program

The bill level-funds current Pell Grant Program appropriations and maintains the maximum grant of \$5,920. However, the subcommittee would rescind \$3.3 billion from the Pell Grant surplus, which totals \$8.5 billion for FY 18. While this rescission is slightly smaller than the \$3.9 billion rescission proposed by President Trump.
