WCCCD offers students six intercollegiate sports:





HPOG provides training, education and supportive services to eligible Wayne County residents that are receiving federal cash assistance for healthcare occupations that pay well and are in high demand.









Division of Institutional Effectiveness

What's Trending in IE: Graduate Exit Survey

During WCCCD's 2017 Commencement Ceremony, the Division of Institutional Effectiveness administered the Graduate Exit Survey to the 2017 graduates. The survey is designed to capture new graduates' immediate perceptions of their overall academic and student life experiences upon degree completion from WCCCD. Data collected is used to support evidence-based planning, decisions, and recommendations for improvement in key areas that influence student engagement and success.





Major Findings from the 2016 Graduate Exit Survey

- √ 93.8% of respondents indicated that they would recommend WCCCD to others, an increase of 10% from the 2015 responses.
- √ 93.2% of respondents indicated that WCCCD has empowered them to achieve their goals as stated in its mission statement.
- √ 86.4% of respondents indicated a WCCCD education has helped them in pursuing further education.



Card skimming, the practice of using an electronic device to record account data encoded on the magnetic stripe on a credit, debit or ATM card, has grown to a \$1 billion-plus annual business, according to published reports. Here are some tips to help you protect yourself:

- Use ATMs you are familiar with
- Cover the keypad to screen cameras before entering a PIN
- Use a machine that is inside a bank whenever possible
- Check your account online to make sure there are no suspicious charges
- Be wary of those trying to help you, especially when an ATM "eats" your card. They may be trying to steal your card number and PIN.
- Contact your bank immediately if your card is lost, stolen or subject to fraudulent use

In partnership with Henry Ford Wyandotte Hospital, WCCCD hosted a course for emergency medical services instructor coordinators on student evaluations.




























